Crowds Visit Crater Lake

Despite the poor skiing at Crater Lake national park this week-end, dozens of people flocked to the winter sports resort over Saturday and Sunday.

The radio report from the park headquarters this morning said that the skies were bright and clear, and the air crisp and cold. Minimum temperature was registered at 6 degrees and the maximum at 24 degrees. Sixty-one inches of snow were reported on the ground, one foot of it new and soft.

Headquarters reported 60 cars bearing 189 persons passed through the portals to the park during the week-end. Roads in the park were icy and chains were advised. No accidents were reported, however.

The Crater Lake Lodge company did a fine business over the week-end at the park mess hall. The mess hall was opened Saturday for breakfast, lunch and dinner for the first time since the end of the war. Eight persons took advantage of the lodge accommodations to spend the night in the park.
