

High School Girl Beaten

Sybil Sumrow, 13, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hubert S. Sumrow of 2418 Ward, was dismissed from Hillside hospital at noon today after she had been treated for injuries received late Saturday night when she was allegedly beaten by another high school girl.

Faye Blackmer, deputy juvenile officer investigating the case, said that Sybil had been to a basketball game at the high school Saturday night and after the game she had been accosted by another girl and four teenage boys.

She got on a bus to go home and the car followed the bus out S. 6th to where she got out at Ward.

At the corner, Mrs. Blackmer said, the girl in the car called Sybil and asked if she were "mad." Sybil replied that she wasn't, and the girl in the car got out and struck her about the face, then got back in the car and left.

Another high school youth saw the incident and took Sybil to her home.

She was admitted to the hospital about midnight and treated for a broken nose and black eye.

No charges have been placed against the young people in the car, Mrs. Blackmer said, but the investigation is continuing.

Taft Says He Won't Run

ATLANTA, Dec. 17 (AP)—Senator Taft (R-Ohio) said Monday he was not at present a candidate for the Republican nomination for president of the United States.

Speaking at a press conference, Taft was asked whether he considered himself as actively in the field as a candidate at this time.

He replied: "No."

Taft said he was speaking only for himself and not for the party but predicted the congress would pass a "comprehensive bill on labor relations." He declined to detail the legislation but said it certainly would include most of the points enacted in the Case bill, which was vetoed by President Truman last session.

Taft again predicted congress would enact a general 20 per cent cut in income taxes, but declined to elaborate.

State Idle Figure Climbs

SALEM, Dec. 17 (AP)—There were 35,000 unemployed persons in Oregon on December 1, a gain of 11,000 during November, the state unemployment compensation commission said Monday.

Only 2581 non-seasonal job openings were reported at the start of this month, compared with 5820 a month earlier.

Of those reported jobless, benefit claims were received from 21,540 persons in the first week of December. Readjustment allowances were asked by 9119 veterans, while 12,361 asked state compensation.

Ice Cream Makers Ask Law Change

SALEM, Dec. 17 (AP)—Oregon ice cream manufacturers will meet in Portland next Friday to decide whether to ask the legislature to repeal the war emergency legislation which reduced the fat content of ice cream from 12 to 8 per cent, O. K. Beals, chief of the state division of foods and dairies, said today.

Beals said some manufacturers claim there no longer is need for the law.

The law would expire six months after the war officially ends.

KELLOGG, Idaho, Dec. 17 (AP)—Kellogg was without a water supply Monday in the wake of floods which disturbed communications and transportation service here and in Wallace yesterday.

A crew trying to divert flooding Elk creek off railroad tracks to a new channel broke a water main early last night, officials said. Residents were getting along with the water left in the pipes. The main was expected to be repaired today. The Bunker Hill-Sullivan mine could divert water from its own system to Kellogg in an emergency.

A power pole washed out at Pine creek and cut off several Interstate Telephone company circuits in the area. Plant Supervisor Arleigh Q. White said. Repairs were expected to be completed today.

Western Union service, disrupted yesterday, was restored today. Roads damaged in the area still were passable.

Helicopter Joins Search

SEATTLE, Dec. 17 (AP)—Aerial and ground searches, baffled by weather and inaccessible terrain in their week-long hunt for the missing marine corps transport plane and its 32 passengers, were to be joined today by a helicopter flown from March field to "take a closer look" at two objects noted on the southern slopes of Mount Rainier during yesterday's full-scale aerial search.

At the same time, the search was to branch out to investigate a "terrific bright flash lasting several minutes" which Mr. and Mrs. Quill Robertson, a farm couple living in the isolated Pleasant valley area near Elbe, reported last night that they saw last Tuesday. Elbe is 20 miles west of Longmire.

Small craft from McChord field today concentrated their hunt on Bald hill, southeast of Silver lake, on reports of W. B. Ray, route 1, Eatonville, that he saw three smoke bombs in that vicinity this forenoon and a large fire there at 1 a. m. last night. Silver lake is five miles west of Eatonville which is west of Mt. Rainier.

Still another possibility was reported last night from Yakima. Two brothers, Floyd and Walter Lindsay, said they heard a plane last Tuesday with its motors "acting up" while they were cutting Christmas trees in the mountains west of Golden-dale. The plane sounded as though headed towards mountains approximately 7000 feet high to the northwest, they said.

PORTLAND, Dec. 17 (AP)—Opening arguments in the trial of James Wesley Bowden, 47, on a first degree murder charge in the trunk bomb killing of his wife were to be heard in court today.

Assembly Confirms Blum Cabinet

PARIS, Dec. 17 (AP)—The French national assembly confirmed Premier Leon Blum's all-socialist cabinet today to head a five-week caretaker government. The vote was 580 to 16.

The cabinet announced it would hold its first governmental session tomorrow, with the financial situation as its chief concern.

Premier Blum also will serve as president and foreign minister of the interim regime. In a speech presenting his cabinet to the assembly for approval he warned France of sacrifices and "severe economies" to come. He was applauded warmly.

Byrnes Praises Big Four Council

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—Secretary of State Byrnes today hailed the achievements of the big four council of foreign ministers and the United Nations assembly as cause for rejoicing.

In his first Washington news conference in nearly two months, however, Byrnes told reporters that the progress made in the international huddles and the progress toward unity which the big powers made there do not mean that all the difficulties have been overcome.

Just back from New York and looking fit, he expressed particular pleasure over the foreign ministers' agreement to appoint deputies and make a start on getting together on a platform with Austria and a peace pact for Germany.

"Warm" Weather Opens Schools

DAWSON, Y. T., Dec. 17 (AP)—Schools were open again today after the weather moderated to only 40 below.

Dropping thermometers hit the Yukon a month ago and last week the mercury dropped to an official 61 degrees below zero and an unofficial 70 degrees below. Old-timers called it the coldest winter in 20 years.

The two schools closed and the 200 children stayed home. Social gatherings were cancelled and a shortage of wood fuel was feared as wood-haulers quit work.

But with moderating weather yesterday, schools reopened.
