

# Baruch Calls On Atomic Commission For Action

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Dec. 17 (AP)—Bernard M. Baruch formally called upon the United Nations atomic energy commission today to approve the United States plan for harnessing the atom.

In a brief speech to the full meeting of the commission, Baruch said that the question had been debated long enough and that the time for action had come.

Baruch, the United States representative of the atomic energy commission, came to the meeting with the determination to push for a decision as soon as possible.

# Wildlife Fund To Be Upped

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—A gradual but certain increase in expenditures for wildlife restoration—curtailed during the war—is planned by the interior department.

Fish and wildlife service officials told a reporter they had decided to resume the work on a part-time scale this year but budgetary restrictions changed the program.

Assurance that an increase was on the books coincided with protests from various states against a limitation of \$2,500,000 for the government year ending next June and reports of a like limitation for the next fiscal year.

The money is derived from excise taxes on sporting goods and the federal government is supposed to allot proportionate sums to each state. While wartime curtailments have not been fully removed, the officials said the fund is being kept intact for future use.

Department officials added that Secretary Krug was anxious to resume full-scale operations but thought he should accede to budgetary trends in the immediate future.

# Cruelty Case May Be Tried Again

PORTLAND, Dec. 17 (AP)—The case of "Mary the mare that went to court" may be tried once more—and the horse may again ride the elevator to stomp before a jury.

Attorney Walter H. Evans said he may ask for a new trial after three jurors told the court they received letters and telephone calls from irate persons asking a heavy penalty against Albert B. Price, 62, found guilty yesterday on a charge of cruelty to an animal.

The shaggy brown mare was taken into the court room, up four stories by elevator, to exhibit the scars the prosecution said were caused when the disheveled looking beast was dragged behind price's truck.

LA GRANDE, Dec. 17 (AP)—The air search and rescue program of the Civil Air Patrol in eastern Oregon was set up today with the naming of W. M. Pierson of La Grande as commander of CAP district four.

Oregon CAP Wing Commander Col. Harry Coffee reported Pierson would direct a squadron of 45 to 50 airplanes in any rescue mission in the area east of Heppner to the Idaho border and north to the Columbia river and south to the Nevada border.

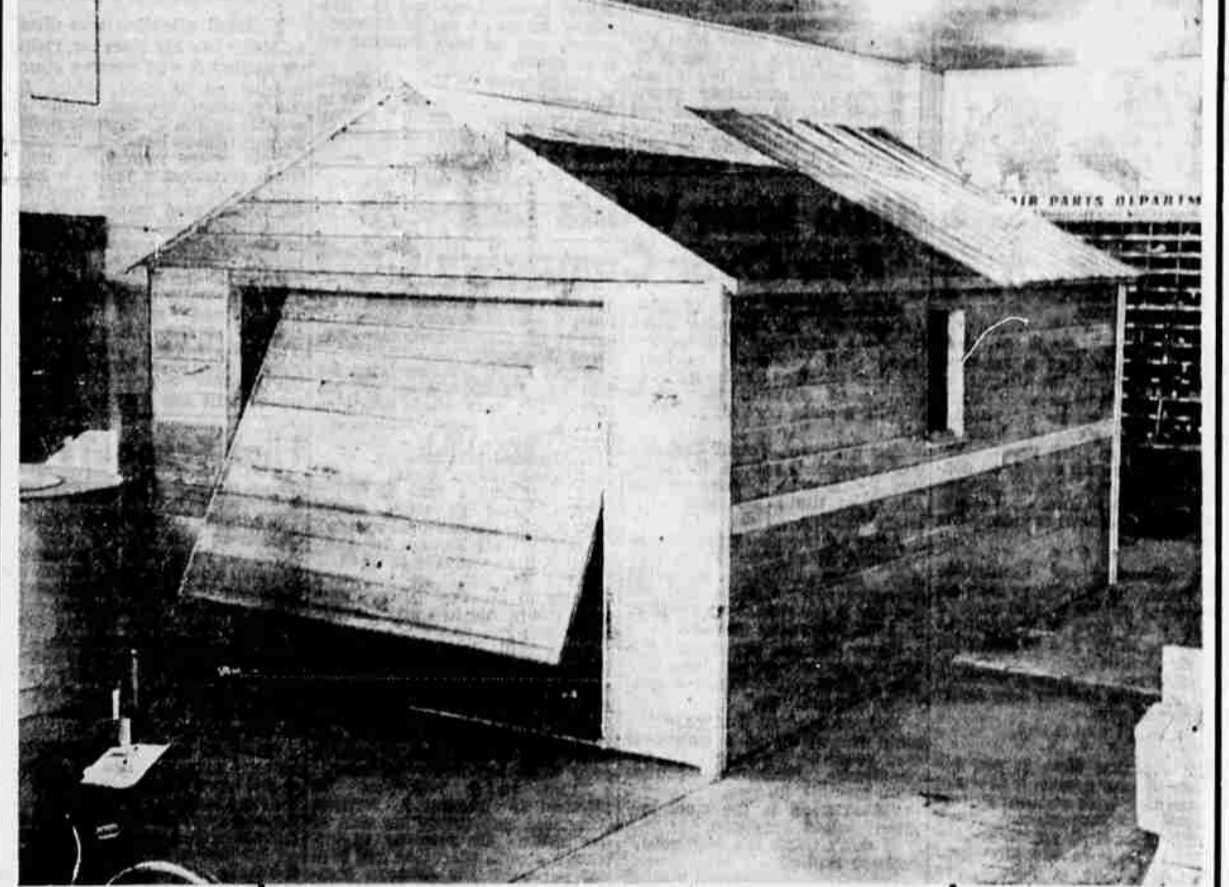
