

Reds Accuse Iran Of Terrorism

MOSCOW, Dec. 19 (AP)—A Tass dispatch from Tabriz asserted today that Iranian government troops had slain hundreds of persons in Azerbaijan provinces in the last few days and had connived in attacks upon Soviet institutions and citizens.

In Tabriz alone, Tass declared, more than 600 persons have been killed and 300 arrested by the troops, who were dispatched to Azerbaijan for the announced purpose of maintaining order during the forthcoming parliamentary elections.

"Bandit elements and detachments of soldiers under Col. Hashemi in Tabriz have been brutally mobbing democratic elements for several days, arresting hundreds of persons and shooting them on the spot," the dispatch said.

"Bodies of hundreds of democrats are lying everywhere on the streets of the city. The building of the central committee of the Azerbaijan democratic party, editorial offices of local newspapers, the national museum and other cultural institutions of Azerbaijan have been smashed."

The dispatch added that "incited by elements hostile to the Soviet Union and under the protection of Col. Hashemi, bandits have broken loose, also attacking Soviet institutions and Soviet citizens in Tabriz."

It was the first major charge to be made by Moscow against the central government of Iran since the Soviet-supported semi-autonomous provincial government in Azerbaijan agreed last week to permit central government troops to enter the province—after a short-lived "civil war"—for the purpose of supervising elections.

Farm Price Drop Foreseen

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 19 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson told an Ohio grange convention audience last night to expect "a turning down of prices" after next fall's harvest, but declared that "agriculture is on a sound basis and the efficient farmer should be able to continue to make a good living."

"Farmers realize prices of their products can go too high for their own good," Anderson said. "This is a time for forward-looking—a time to work for maximum consumption with a price level that will still provide fair returns to those involved in production and distribution."

"Much of our present production is going to fill a backlog of needs built up during the war and paid for out of wartime savings," Anderson said. "An abnormally large portion of food is going to foreign consumers and some of it is being paid for by American loans. Economists will tell you that eventually these pent-up needs will be satisfied . . . and we shall then be faced with over-production and surpluses."

Wallace Denies Baruch Story

NEW YORK, Dec. 19 (AP)—Henry A. Wallace, new editor of the New Republic magazine, said last night he "had nothing to do" with an article in the publication dealing with the coal controversy which Bernard M. Baruch branded as "wholly false and deliberately so."

The article was in the December 16 issue of the magazine, the first under the former vice president's direction, and said that President Truman "delegated the leadership" in the legal battle against John L. Lewis "to the toughest men around him; General Counsel Clark Clifford and the ubiquitous George Allen, both reinforced by conservative Bernard Baruch."
