Pulp Mill To Be Built

TACOMA, Dec. 19 (AP)—The planned inclusion of a paper machine and a paper bag mill at the Tacoma plant of St. Regis Paper company, was disclosed today in an announcement by Roy K. Ferguson of New York, company president.

The firm now operates only a pulp mill in Tacoma, but recently purchased 261 acres adjoining its tideflat location.

Walter Delong, Tacoma, vice president of the concern, said that although paper work is going ahead on the enlarged plant, unsettled conditions and difficulty in obtaining equipment make the exact date of the addition uncertain.

Spectacular Fire Destroys Elevator

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 19 (AP)—A spectacular fire, with flames shooting more than 150 feet into the air and visible for several miles, destroyed the union grain elevator filled with nearly 3,000,000 bushels of grain today. Early reports were that the elevator was filled with barley and at current market prices the loss was expected to run into more than \$3,000,000.

The building was owned by the Fredbert Grain and Malt company of Milwaukee. Immediately the cause of the fire was not determined but it was believed to have started from grain which became overheated when it clogged in a chute.
