

12 Jap Policemen Injured In Clash With Koreans

TOKYO, Dec. 20 (AP)—Twelve Japanese policemen and several Koreans were injured today in a free-for-all fight at Premier Yoshida's official residence as an estimated 2000 Koreans forced their way through a police cordon. Doors and windows were smashed.

The Koreans, charging discrimination, demanded that the government "protect the livelihood of Koreans." After a mass meeting, the crowd—men, women and children—had marched to Yoshida's home.

Ten representatives of the League of Koreans residing in Japan, which sponsored the meeting, went into the premier's residence to discuss their demands with government officials. The crowd became rest-

less waiting and demanded admittance.

The police closed the gates to the residence and tried to block the crowd, but it surged through and overwhelmed the club-swinging officers.

The 35-minute battle ended after the arrival of 10 U. S. military police and a contingent of metropolitan police who ordered the Koreans to leave.

Tokyo police arrested 10 Korean leaders.

Police said they fired four shots into the air in a futile effort to disperse the crowd and charged some Koreans fired pistols.

The crowd assaulted the police with bamboo poles, fists and the sticks on which they were carrying placards.

Five hours after the battle, some Koreans still remained around the premier's residence and another crowd gathered at the imperial plaza about a mile away, where the mass meeting had been held.

The melee was the latest evidence of smoldering Korean-Japanese feeling. It was the first battle since General MacArthur's May 5 warning that the allies would intervene unless "physical processes of intimidation" were halted.

Thirty-six Koreans recently were given jail sentences and ordered deported as the aftermath of a gun battle with Japanese police in April, when 17 were killed.

Oregon Plant To Stay Open

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—The reconstruction finance corporation said today that the \$5,000,000 government alumina plant at Salem, Ore., will continue operations after January 1.

The plant will produce fertilizer, chiefly for UNRRA distribution, the RFC notified Senator Cordon (R-Ore.). The RFC said arrangements have been made for the Willamette Fertilizer company to take over the plant next year from the Columbia Metals company, which also has produced fertilizer, ammonium sulphate.

The senator said the plant's continuance would improve the over-all fertilizer situation in Oregon.

Phone Company To Build Repeaters

PORTLAND, Dec. 20 (AP)—The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company sought authority yesterday from the civilian production administration to build over-all fertilizer situation in Oregon.
