

# Livestock Feeding May Solve Wheat Surplus Snag

HARVEY Jr. SALEM, Dec. 20 (AP)—While state agencies are seeking more uses of wheat in industry as a means of solving the acute surplus wheat problem that is expected in a year or two, Prof. A. W. Oliver of the Oregon State college animal husbandry department thinks he has a partial answer.

He thinks much of the anticipated surplus could be used for fattening all types of livestock. Professor Oliver points out that 75,000 feeder cattle are produced each year in Oregon but are sent to other states for fattening. He wants wheat to be used to fatten them in Oregon. Forty per cent of Oregon's lambs are sold as feeders, and the Pacific coast produces only half the pork it eats. Storage facilities for wheat are inadequate, to give more of the professor's arguments for using wheat for livestock.

He says ground wheat is as good as other grains for fattening animals, but that the amount of grain required can be reduced by 25 to 33 per cent by use of pasture crops, such as alfalfa, clover, growing grain or brass.

With all grains protein supplements are needed. Professor Oliver says that when 100 pounds of pork, live weight, on the farm, sells for

the same as 650 pounds of grain, the hog raiser will get pay for his feed, interest, taxes, labor and other expenses. If ground wheat sells for \$40 a ton, hogs would have to sell for 13 cents a pound on the farm to pay the costs.

A 700-pound yearling steer fed 800 pounds of ground wheat and 2400 pounds of hay can be fattened in only 100 days. He said cattle will gain more rapidly on pasture and grain than in the feed lot.

One hundred pounds of whole wheat and 200 pounds of alfalfa will get a lamb ready for market in 100 days, the lamb weighing 60 or 70 pounds at the start of the feeding and 90 to 100 pounds when ready for the market.

The U. S. department of agriculture said Oregon and California are the only two western states which have an increase over last year in the number of cattle in feed lots.

Butter market prices are falling because consumers are resisting high prices, and because the supply is becoming more plentiful due to diversion of milk from cheese and fluid cream to butter, the USDA says.

When farmers make out their federal income tax estimates, which are due January 15, they shouldn't forget that they can deduct premiums paid for federal crop insurance.

The program for giving veterans preference for buying farm machinery ended this month. During the 20 months the program was in effect, \$700 preference certificates were given to Oregon veterans. But only a third of them could get delivery on the machinery they wanted.

Oregon's 1946 pear production was 6,000,000 bushels, 17 per cent above last year's crop. The national pear crop totaled 35,000,000 bushels, or 6 per cent above last year.

# Boston Wool Market Slow

BOSTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow of the Boston wool market:

"Insignificant trading was the rule in wool for the week. Almost nothing was done in domestic wool, though revalued stocks were said to offer good values and perhaps even more so the outright holdings of dealers who purchased before prices were raised on CCC supplies. Statistics bear out the idea that mills are well supplied for the time being and, with stocktaking at hand, mills take only scattered lots.

"In foreign wool, even a very quiet market produced a good sale here and there. Figures now out on September consumption reflect a diminishing use of foreign wool, but it still predominates and supplies have also been lessening. Buying to piece out mill stocks makes for some turnover all the time, where spot wool may be had.

"Strange contrasts mark the trends between foreign and domestic wool. The use of foreign is gradually dipping, but the year 1946 promises a consumption not far under 850 million pounds, or a new record. Domestic, although gaining, will hardly reach 260,000,000 pounds. It seems the lowest for recent years, and perhaps for the century.
