Poultry Sale In Klamath Area Drops

Sale of poultry products has dropped considerably in Klamath county during the war years. It was revealed at the organization meeting of the poultry committee for the county farm program planning conference yesterday.

The poultry industry is 25 per cent below economic production for the county, commented Stan Soron, committee chairman. Noel Bennion, poultry specialist of the Oregon State college extension service, Corvallis, attended the session and presented a trend of the national and state poultry situation. Bennion pointed out that the production of poultry products in the United States has increased approximately 50 per cent during the war. However, per capita of production on the Pacific coast is below pre-war level. During the past 15 years, the Pacific coast has changed from a large exporting to an importing area.

It was pointed out during the meeting that Oregon eggs bring approximately 15 cents more per dozen in areas shipped to than eastern or mid-western eggs. This is due to the better quality of Oregon eggs.

The second session of the committee in drafting recommendations for presentation to the farm program planning conference, February 28, will be held the latter part of January.

Some of the additional items to be considered at that time will be the poultry housing, breeds of poultry, trends in sizes of flocks, purchasing baby chicks, brooding and rearing chicks, and possibilities of producing meat-type chickens in Klamath county.
