

# Collection Viewed By Club Members

Members of the Art Needlework club met Wednesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. D. V. Kuykendall, 848 California avenue.

Mrs. Kuykendall is a collector, her special hobby being pitchers. She has around 200 pitchers in all shapes, sizes, and materials, from hand-painted ones that hold a half gallon of liquid, to tiny ones of near two-tablespoon capacity.

An old-time box or shaving kit, a family heirloom, has an interesting story, worth setting down here: "Some firm, or carpenter, conceived the idea of making souvenirs from the rails of Henry Clay's fence at Ashland, Kentucky. They made quite a few boxes, or shaving kits, of pine wood with a veneer made of the ash rails of Henry Clay's fence, and sold two of these to Charles F. and Nathan Putnam, who lived in Lexington.

"In 1846 the Putnams started for Oregon, bringing these boxes with them. They came to Fort Hall and then took the southern route through Oregon through the Rogue River valley. They left their wagons near where Phoenix, Ore. is now, and the Indians burned them. They put their cattle onto Judge J. F. Thornton's wagon, and got him through to Oregon City.

"Nathan Putnam died at Oregon City the first winter, at the home of Dr. Bailey. He was the oldest of the two, and an architect by trade. Charles F. Putnam, who was a printer, went to work on the "Oregon Spectator," and was married soon afterwards.

"Nathan's box was probably left where he died, with the Baileys. Charles F. brought it to where he settled in Douglas county, Ore."

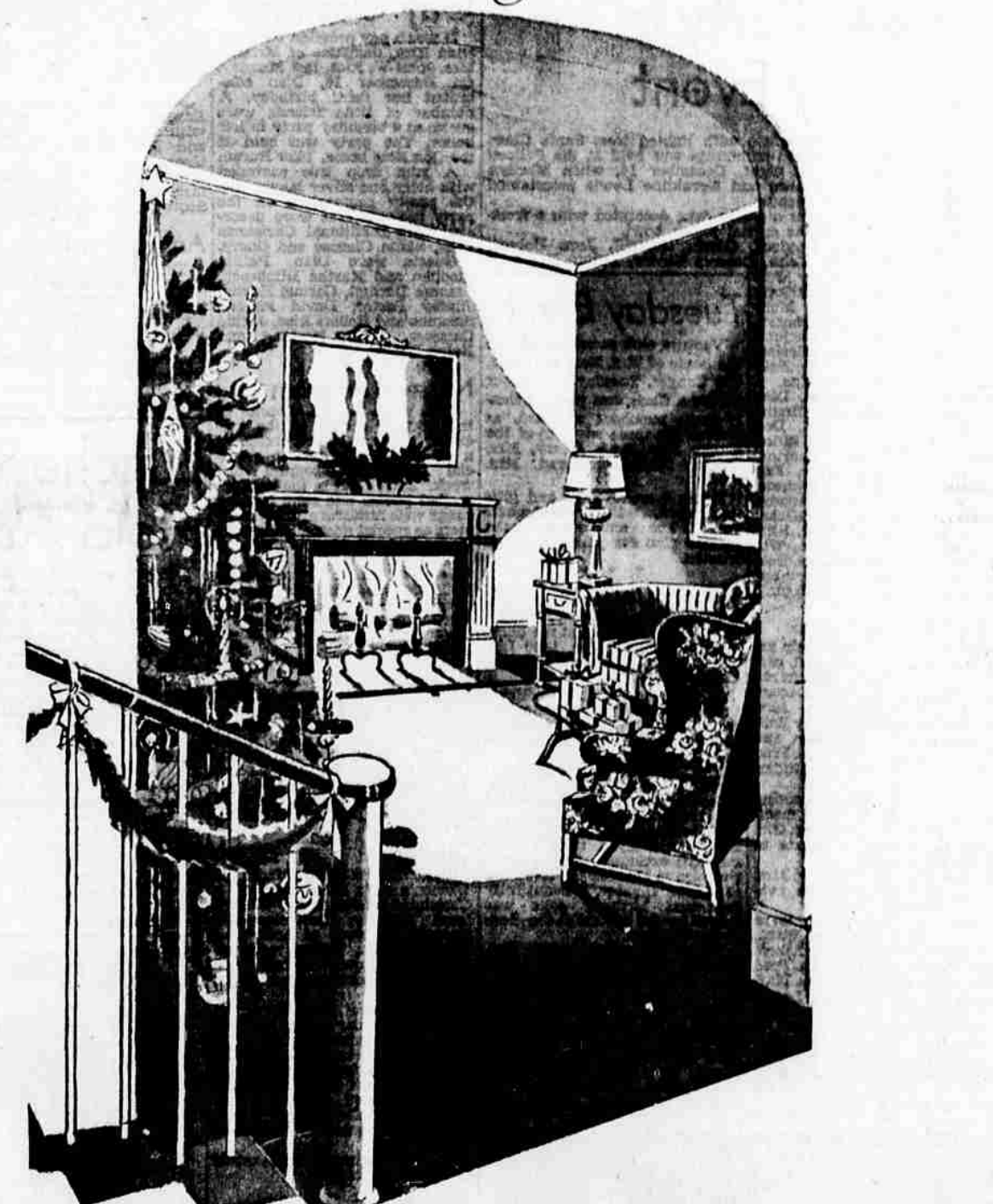
