

Stock Market Shows Loss

NEW YORK, Dec. 23 (AP)—The stock market, with a scattered exception, contemplated a quiet retreat today after an early attempt to continue the upswing encountered more offerings than bids.

While real pressure never was in evidence, a decision of fractions to a point or so were spread over most departments following a slightly spotty opening. Pivotal steers, motors, rails and rubbers were among the first to slip. Dealings, while picking up at intervals, frequently slowed. Extreme losses were reduced in a number of cases near the close. Transactions for the day proceeded in a range around 1,200,000 shares.

Casualties included U. S. Steel, Chrysler, Goodrich, U. S. Rubber, Southern Railway, N. Y. Central, Great Northern, General Electric, Douglas Aircraft, Eastman Kodak, American Telephone and Standard Oil (N. J.). Resistant were Schenley, Western Union, A. T. & T. Radio Corp. and International Harvester.

Bonds were in moderate supply.

Wheat Market Depressed

CHICAGO, Dec. 23 (AP)—Small scale selling throughout the session depressed wheat and corn today, although the July contracts of both grains displayed relatively steadiness. Oats were more resistant to lower trends and held with fractions of the previous close.

There was nothing in the news to stimulate either buying or selling and markets drifted in a light trade. Traders said the low volume was not unusual for the Christmas holiday period. Tomorrow the board will close at noon and will remain closed Wednesday.

Wheat closed 1/2c lower to 1/4c higher, January \$2.10 1/2, corn was 1/4c lower to 1/2c higher, January \$1.31 1/2-1.31 and oats finished 1/4c lower to 1/2c higher, March 75 1/2-75c.

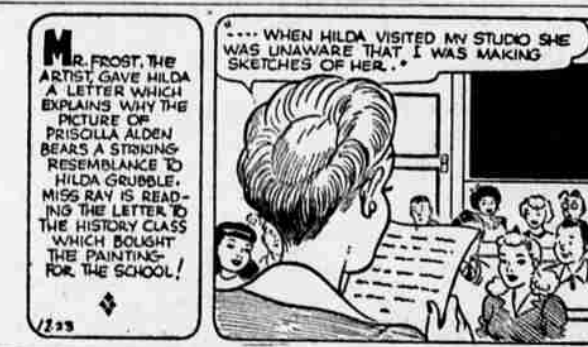
