

# Market Shows Moderate Loss

NEW YORK, Dec. 30 (AP)—A heavy day's trading in the stock market showed a moderate loss. In the majority of cases, hesitancy was the rule from the start. Dealings quickened at intervals but there were occasional slowdowns. Trends steadied after midday. While advances of fractions or so dotted the ticker tape near the close, declines were plentiful. Transfers ran to around 1,400,000 shares.

An isolated wide climber was American Telephone. John-Matville was another. Supported were Chrysler, International Telephone, Northern Pacific, Sears Roebuck, Du Pont and Standard Oil (N. J.).

Laggards included General Motors, Goodrich, Woodworth, International Harvester, Caterpillar, Tractor, Western Union, "A" Transcontinental & Western Air, U. S. Gypsum, Texas Co., Santa Fe, Pennsylvania Railroad and General Electric.

Numerous year-end "cash" sales for income tax purposes appeared and acted as a restraining influence. Industrial railroad bonds improved. Closing quotations:

## GRAIN

**CHICAGO, Dec. 30 (AP)**—Another typical pre-holiday season of low volume and small price changes was recorded on the board of trade today. The board will close at noon tomorrow and will be closed all day Wednesday.

There was moderate selling by cash interests in the January wheat contract, but otherwise grains drifted in an aimless fashion. Cash markets were steady and distillers again were good buyers of corn. Shipping sales out of the market totaled around 128,000 bushels.

Wheat closed 1/2c lower to 1/2c higher, January \$2.10 1/2, corn was 1/2c lower to 1/2c higher, January \$1.20 1/2-1/4, and unchanged to 1/2c higher, March 72 1/2-1/4.

The first real cold wave of the season spread over the midwest and was expected to increase feeding demand for corn.
