# Pine Shipping Near Peak

PORTLAND, Jan. 4 (AP)—Pine mills in the western states will ship 1,200,000,000 board feet of lumber in the next three months. That's the prediction of the Western Pine association, which added this figure would be about 25 per cent greater than the peacetime record established last year, and about equal to the average wartime production. Association mills put out 5,880,000,000 feet last year and shipped 5,730,000,000 feet.

## GRAIN

CHICAGO, Jan. 4 (AP)—Grains moved ahead under persistent buying today. Wheat, corn and oats all advancing for gains extending to more than a cent at times.

Major factor in the advance was an unconfirmed Washington report that export quota allocations for February would be increased. An agriculture department statement that shipments abroad in December were up substantially from immediately preceding months.

Part of the demand in wheat came from elevator and shipping interests. Cash and commission houses brought corn. Short-covering was apparent in oats.

Reports in trade circles said the production and marketing administration had purchased some hard wheat flour and had asked for additional offers next week of both hard and soft wheat flour. Wheat closed 7-8 1/2 higher, January \$2.12 1/2, corn was unchanged to 1/4 higher, January \$1.35 1/2, and oats 1/4 to a cent higher, March 75 1/2-3/4.

NEW YORK, Jan. 4 (AP)—Associated stocks extended Friday's late recovery in today's market, one of the slowest of the past year, while many leaders continued to retreat.

The ticker tape loomed from the start. Most departments showed fractional advances near the close but minus signs were plentiful. Transfers for the two hours dwindled to around 300,000 shares.

Moderate support was accorded Baltimore & Ohio, Schenley, Montgomery Ward, Bethlehem, Chrysler, Douglas Aircraft, United Aircraft, North American, Public Service of N. J., American Water Works, Eastman Kodak, J. C. Penney, American Smelting, and U. S. Rubber.

Heaviest were U. S. Steel, Woodworth, International Harvester, Anconia, Westinghouse, Boeing, Inland Carbide, U. S. Gypsum and Great Northern.

Bonds were narrow and commodities relatively steady.

In the curb improved tendencies were displayed by Atlas Plywood, Cuban Atlantic Sugar, Barium Steel, North American Light, Scovill Mfg. and Inland Aircraft.
