

# Crawford, Taking Off For Capital, Hits Indian Bureau

Firing a broadside of grievances at the Indian service, Wade Crawford, Klamath tribal delegate to Washington, today issued a statement vigorously supporting a senate bill 1313—or "any kind of legislation that will give the Indians individual rights and destroy communism on the reservations."

Crawford's statement followed a recent announcement from the Klamath county court that it favored the liquidation measure now in congress. He made his comments just before leaving for Washington, where he and Boyd Jackson will represent the Indians.

It is understood Crawford and Jackson do not see eye to eye on a number of issues. Crawford's statement referred in part to a report in a previous story that the Klamath Indian council had not favored his bill, S 1313, inasmuch as the council did not act on it when it came up.

"It is quite time for the public and the Oregon members of congress to rise to the defense of the Klamath Indians and all American Indians and protect them as individuals and human beings, as has been done for negroes, Jews and all other races who inhabit this country," said Crawford.

The tribal delegate accused the Indian service of "hard-fisted, one-sided bureaucracy that grinds people under and has no place in democracy."

Crawford asserted the Indians of the Klamath reservation have been held in bondage for 83 years, and have been declared incompetent by the Indian bureau, though no court has ever ruled them so.

"The Klamath reservation is politically managed and controlled by the Indian bureau and interests that benefit thereby," charged Crawford. He said tribal lands and individual lands, as well as tribal and individual funds are controlled
