The Shasta View grange will meet tonight, Thursday, in the schoolhouse at which time the West-Hitchcock corporation will show technicolor films. The company has on hand ten films on travel and other topics of interest which will be made available with an operator for organizations which desire them. The grange will open a membership drive with a banquet to highlight the opening of the campaign.

Petitions seeking the establishment of a street lighting district for S. 6th will be presented to the city council at its meeting next Monday for adoption. It was announced by George Conner, chairman of the S. 6th street improvement association.

Well over the required 50 per cent of the signers needed for the establishing of the district was obtained and it is expected that the project will get under way in the near future.

The Swan Lake Moulding company, the Brown Equipment company and Klamath theatres have proposed to light their portion of the street in the vicinity of their business establishments at the expense of the operators.

Proof that Klamath Falls is reaching out for new industrial locations is evident with the announcement that a new farm equipment plant will be opened for business about February 1, near the Lakeview-Merrill highway junction. Four well-known Klamath basin men, I. E. Campbell, H. A. Campbell, Arthur Reed and Dallas Swisher, have under construction a one-story hollow tile structure that when completed will house a complete line of Minneapolis-Moline farm machinery and parts, and a shop for repair work.

The company will also carry a line of domestic water systems. The Campbells, brothers, have farmed for some time in the Olene district and Reed and Swisher have been associated with the Garrison Equipment company and the former Mitchell, Lewis and Staver company.

The building will contain floor space of 3200 feet and has been built to accommodate expansion. R. E. Campbell will be in charge of the shop and Reed will manage the sales department.

This is the first complete line of Minneapolis-Moline equipment here since the J. W. Kerns company, many years ago.

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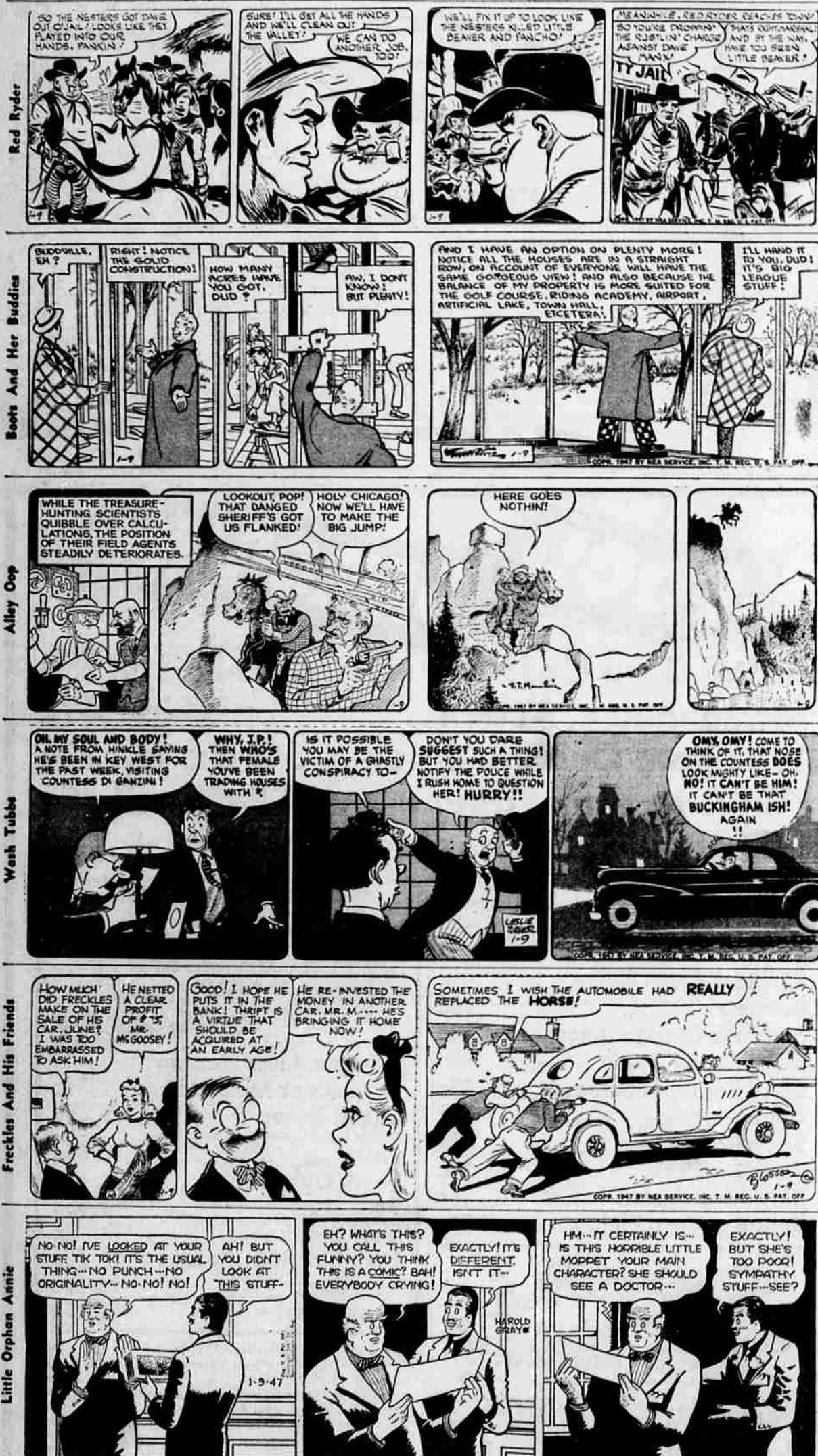
