

Crater Lake Winter Sports Lure Starts

Wrinkles In Sub-Contract For Ski Tow Must Be Smoothed Before Newly-Built 1000-Foot Lift Begins Operation

A ski tow at Crater lake is built and virtually ready for operation, but will not be working for slope enthusiasts this week-end, according to word received from Park Superintendent E. P. Leavitt in Medford.

The tow is being installed, tentatively at Knob hill, by Al Vincez on a sub-contract from the Crater Lake company, but the contract has not yet been approved by the national park service and the tow can't be operated until that approval is forthcoming.

The winter sports program is just barely getting under way for the first season since the war and the skiing season runs from now through February and March and probably April.

51 to 32 . . . Pels Win Handily Over Ashland Five

Starting out like world-beaters, the KUHS Pelicans never let the issue slide into doubt as they throttled the Ashland Grizzlies 51 to 32 on the KU court. The Pels had run up eight points before their first conference foe scored, and maintained a six to 19-point lead throughout the game.

Clarence Busman, who played a sparkling floor game, was pushed in the first tally of the game and that was followed by a long shot from LeRoy Coleman and two ringers by Gene Hoover before Ashland's Glenn Wade found the hoop.

The Pelicans were ahead 13 to 7 at the quarter. The tally had mounted to 29-18 by half-time.

In the third quarter neither team made a basket for over two minutes, then Coleman started off the scoring with a long rimmer. George Fullerton made the only two-point shot of the quarter for Ashland, but Bill Montgomery, Vernon Carlson and Jerry Mitchell added foul shots to keep the Grizzlies in the game.

Score was 35-23 at the end of the third quarter. Ashland staged a minor rally in the finale to pull within eight points of the Pels again, but couldn't keep it up and the Pelicans pulled on ahead.

The two teams got together again tonight for the second game of the series, starting at 8:15 on the home court. A tilt between the KU Wildcats and Malin will presage the main go. The Klamath-Ashland game will be broadcast over KFLW by Don Neal.

Last night in the preliminary game the Wildcats were barely nosed out in an overtime period by the Pelican Junior varsity, 39-35. The score was 35-35 at the end of the fourth quarter, but Bob Loper sank one of two free throws and saved another basket for the Javvee win.

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Help Wanted---Man Who Can Coach Football

NEW YORK, Jan. 11 (AP)—The "Help Wanted" shingle was out at least a dozen colleges today after another flurry of job-trading.

More than a score of pigskin tutors have turned in their suits since the season's close, and relatively few of the vacancies have been filled.

Latest advertisements for help are from the University of Maryland, Lafayette and Colby, which lost their head coaches yesterday. T-master Clark Shaugnessy resigned the second time from Maryland, E. Z. (Hooks) Mylin bowed out at Lafayette and Danny Lewis quit the little Maine school.

Meanwhile, two vacancies were filled. Ed McKeever, who had resigned from Cornell, signed a three-year contract as head coach at the University of San Francisco, and Cornell selected George K. (Lefty) James as his successor at Ithaca. James had been an assistant at Cornell 11 years.

At San Francisco McKeever succeeds Maurice (Clipper) Smith, who left college ranks to direct the National football league's Boston Yanks. James' appointment at Cornell leaves Colgate as the only upstate New York school seeking a coach. That job was vacated by 68-year-old Andy Kerr, who retired after reaching the school's age limit.

The vacancy at Syracuse left by the resignation of Biggie Munn to take over Charlie Bachman's job at Michigan state had been filled previously with the elevation of Assistant Coach Reaves Baysinger.

New York university is seeking a replacement for Jack Weinheimer, who stepped down after the close of the season. Boston university replaced Walt Holmer with Buff Donelli, former coach at Duquesne and late

Matty Bell Calls Purity Code Impractical Gesture

DALLAS, Jan. 11 (AP)—Matty Bell, outspoken football coach and athletic director of Southern Methodist university, calls the National Collegiate Athletic association's program for limiting financial aid to athletes to tuition and prohibiting off-the-campus recruiting "operational but not from the practical standpoint."

Declaring it was hypocrisy to adopt unworkable rules and seeing in the recruiting clause a further handicap to the smaller schools, Bell said, "The only honest plan is the whole business is that of the southeastern conference which grants room, board, tuition and \$10.00 a month without the pretense that the athlete works for it."

"The southeastern conference is above board," the SMU coach asserted. "Members of other conferences do the same things but just don't say so."

Bell said it was impossible for a boy to work and play football—"he doesn't have time"—and that he did not favor them working except during the off-season, if at all. But he said a

Barney Ross Scores Kayo Over Toughest Foe--Dope

LEXINGTON, Ky., Jan. 11 (AP)—Scrappy Barney Ross, one-time king of the welterweights and survivor of tough Pacific fighting, has scored another knockout—this time over the narcotic habit.

The much-decorated veteran of Guadalcanal won his latest in four months. The scenes: the huge U. S. Public Health Service hospital in the rolling hills of the Blue Ridge mountains.

Dr. Victor M. Vogel, medical officer in charge of the institution, announced last night Ross would be discharged Tuesday. Ross declined to discuss his immediate plans.

Ross had appeared voluntarily in the U. S. marshal's office in New York and asked admission to the hospital. He told how drugs had been given him by well-meaning friends while he suffered war wounds and malaria, and how he continued using them after his discharge from the marines as he suffered recurrent headaches.

His victory over narcotics came sooner than expected. When he entered the hospital, Dr. Vogel said the average period needed to cure an addict was about a year, and that much depended on the patient's co-operation and physical condition. Ross' physical condition and courage which carried him through the ring and the war paid off.

Rowe Claims Best Coming

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Jan. 11 (AP)—Lynwood (Schoolboy) Rowe, who admits his biggest baseball thrill occurred more than 12 years ago, came up with a 36th birthday prediction today that 1947 will be one of his most successful years in baseball.

The schoolboy, who hails from Elorado, Ark., sopped in Charlotte last night en route to Philadelphia where he plans to talk things over with his present owners, the Philadelphia Phils. He hasn't signed his 1947 contract but figures he'll have no trouble coming to terms with Bob Carpenter and company.

The tall lanky Arkansan made a spectacular comeback with the Phils last season, ending up with a won and lost record of 11 and 3, and an earned-run average of 2.12.

His fine effort was cut short in the latter part of the year when a pulled ligament in his left leg sent him to the sidelines.

The leg is in good shape now, Rowe reports, and a few additional treatments at Hot Springs, Ark., before spring training should put him in excellent condition.

It was in the 1934 world series that Rowe experienced his biggest thrill. He retired 22 consecutive St. Louis Cardinals on Oct. 4 and finally came up with a 12-inning 3-2 decision.
