trict. Three giant Sno-go's were in operation by state highway crews and sanding was going on. Two Sno-go's were at work on the Willamette pass and the third on Sun mountain. Snowplows worked the Greensprings. The fall was light on Quartz mountain on the Lakeview highway. The 8 a. m. report today advised the state highway office here that it was still snowing hard in all mountain areas. Chains are advised when leaving Klamath Falls.

The state-wide road report advised the Pacific highway ley from Eugene to Junction City; snowing lightly at Roseburg, Salem, Eugene, Portland; snow flurries at Bend and packed snow south of that city with 8 inches of new snow on the Ochoco highway; Skiskiyou summit, Pacific highway, icy.

Portland hills were blanketed today as that city experienced its first general snow of the winter. The state's lowest temperature recorded by the weather bureau was 6 degrees at Bend and Baker.

Bolvin resigned in 1942 as state representative from Klamath county to accept a post with the department of justice, Craver was appointed by the county court to serve out Bolvin's unexpired term. He did not seek re-election. It is understood that Craver has resigned his position as local representative of the BRT.

# Ski Party, Lost In Storm, Spends Frigid Night In Snow

SPOKANE, Jan. 13 (AP)—Three Gonzaga university students, who spent a harrowing 28 hours atop frigid Mount Spokane in a blinding snowstorm, were safe in their homes today after a three-man search party had found them cold and hungry late Sunday afternoon.

The students, Ned Flaherty, Ordeen Burtenshaw and Richard Powell, were reported missing Saturday afternoon while on a skiing trip and a five-hour search for them was halted that night when a raging blizzard engulfed the peak.

The searchers found the boys six miles from the top of a hill from which they had started a ski run. One of the students, 20-year-old Powell, a freshman at the university and an army air forces veteran, told this story of the experience:

"After we hit the bottom of the ski run, we started to walk toward what we thought was the road. Then the storm came up and it got dark so we didn't know where we were. We happened to run into a logger's cabin up there and we went inside, nailed the doors and windows shut and lit a fire.

# Oregon Sets New Gas Use Record

SALEM, Jan. 13 (AP)—An all-time record for the use of gasoline in Oregon was set the first 11 months of 1946. Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell Jr. reported today.

He said the automobiles traveled an estimated four billion miles. The largest monthly sales were in August, when 40,000,000 gallons were consumed in the state. The 11-month period gave the state \$15,000,000 in taxes after refunds were made on fuel for use off the highways.

# Counterfeit Bills Passed In West

PORTLAND, Jan. 13 (AP)—Counterfeit \$5 bills are being passed in west coast cities, the U. S. secret service office here reported today in warning merchants and banks to check any new bills.

They bear face plate No. 928, check letter E, and series 1934A and about 1/4 inch shorter than genuine certificates.

# Farm Building Permit Needed

It is still necessary to file applications for permission to erect farm buildings and residences, according to announcement by the district construction review committee of the civilian production administration, Portland, Ore.

Applications for any residential construction costing over \$400 should be filed with the federal housing administration, Platt building, 519 S. W. Park, Portland 5, Ore., on Form 14-56.

Applications for non-residential buildings, such as barns and milk houses costing over \$1000 should be filed with civilian production administration, 820 Morgan building, Portland 5, Ore., on CPA Form 4423.

Formerly, both types of applications were filed with the city AAA committees. The restriction is a part of the veterans emergency housing act of 1946, enacted by congress last April to assist in the channeling of materials to veterans' housing.

# 6 Burglaries Over Week-End

There were six burglaries in town over the snowy week-end, according to city police report, and a 17-year-old army deserter is held in the juvenile cottage after confessing one of the crimes.

The youth, identified as Charles F. Farrara, AWOL from Saac field, San Antonio, Tex., admitted to police and later to juvenile authorities that he entered Recreation bowling alley on Main street early Sunday morning and broke open the cash boxes of a pinball machine and music box.

Change amounting to \$71.95 was found in his room at the Whitehouse rooms. The break-in was reported to police by Erle Hamilton, bowling alley owner, about 10:30 Sunday morning, and Farrara was arrested about an hour later. He had been working at the bowling alley cleaning up, Hamilton told police.

Faye Blackmer, deputy juvenile officer, said that Farrara has been AWOL from Saac field since September 4, and has been in Klamath Falls about two months. His home is in Louisiana. She said that he would be turned over to army authorities if they want him.

Pilot inn at the airport was the most seriously hit of the other break-ins. Alice Peoples, operator of the cafe, reported that about \$120, mostly in silver, was taken. Entry was made through a hangar and a connecting door was forced.

The Ball and Porter company, 801 Spring, was entered sometime last night and about \$15 taken. Two other buildings on the same street, Heilbroner Fuel company and Drake Lumber company were also burglarized, but the loot was reported as \$4 and 25 cents, respectively.

Art's diner, corner of Spring and Oak, was the sixth place entered last night, but there was no report of any loss.

must find a formula to distribute to school districts the \$15,000,000 state school support fund which was voted by the people last November. He suggested a combination of per capita membership and teacher allocation.

He repeated the request for establishment of camps for delinquent boys, with cities and counties participating; and renewed his recommendation that the state build a reformatory for youthful first offenders. He also asked that the state handicapped children's law be incorporated into the basic school support fund.
