Lake Power Line Readied

LAKEVIEW, Jan. 13.—The alternate power transmission line from Klamath Falls to Lakeview via Alturas will get into construction about March 1 of this year, according to A. B. Wilson, district manager of the California Oregon Power company. Wilson made this statement at a meeting of the Lake County chamber of commerce. He explained that rights of way would be obtained within the next 60 days, and survey of the line now lacked only two or three miles of completion.

In pointing out that this improvement will cost approximately \$250,000, Wilson said that other work to be done here, notably the installation of voltage regulators to control voltage variation, would bring the total of capital expense contemplated to about \$300,000.

The local power head said that power will be obtainable from either of two route sources when the Alturas line is in, calling attention to the fact that only once since 1939 has there been simultaneous power failures on both the Klamath-Lakeview and Klamath-Alturas lines. He voiced the belief that failures in the future will thus be cut to a bare minimum, adding, in response to a question, that the new line would be completed in about three or four months after start of construction.

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

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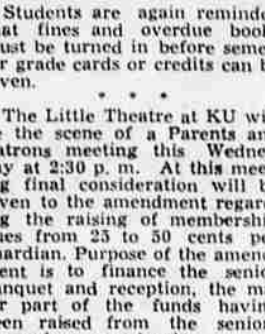
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
