Ice Storage Plant Planned

The Western Fruit Express company has applied for permission to build a 1000-ton capacity ice storage plant in Klamath Falls replacing the old, small storage building now in use.

The civilian production administration in Portland received the application this week, but no action has been taken. The new building will be located in the Great Northern yards, according to present plans.

W. B. DeWitt, station foreman for WFE, said today that business has outgrown present facilities in this area necessitating additional space. The icing platform, which now has a 10-car capacity, will be enlarged to double its present size.

No estimate on the cost of the structure is available. DeWitt stated that construction of the plant has been held off in recent years because of a shortage of necessary materials, but building will begin immediately if the CPA approves the project. The company hopes to have the plant operating in time to handle the next rush shipping period in early June.

'Modified' Closed Shop Bill Proposed In Senate

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (AP)—Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.) proposed a "modified" closed shop bill today, saying that legislation offered by Senator Ball (R-Minn.) is "unnecessarily drastic."

McCarthy, a freshman senator, said in a statement that his bill would provide for continuance of closed and union shops but "with restrictions that will modify them to prevent abuses."

Ball has proposed outlawing labor contracts which make union membership a condition of employment—as in the closed and union shops.

McCarthy's proposal, as he outlined it, provides:

"1. A modified closed shop would be mandatory after two-thirds of the employees voted for it by secret ballot at a supervised election.

"2. The modified 'closed shop' would be 'open' only to the extent that anyone who is refused membership in a labor union or who is expelled from membership in a union would not be denied the right to work.

"3. Outlawing of the permit system, whereby employees in a closed shop are denied union membership, but forced to pay a fee to work."

With labor matters getting top consideration on Capitol Hill, Senator Morse (R-Ore.) urged that congress give first priority to "perfecting" the Wagner labor act.

Democrats Plan First '47 Meeting

A study of teacher salaries in both elementary and Klamath Union high school was undertaken at a meeting of both boards Monday night and presented by Superintendent Arnold L. Gralapp who said the study would continue for another two months.

Members of board 1 took action on the partial acceptance of the Fremont school wing and full acceptance will be sometime later. The building is now in use.

The boards heard John H. Merryman, manager of the Consumers Heating company, outline the new regulations under which the company is now operating and its effect on previous arrangements with the city schools, especially KUHS. Gralapp outlined to the boards the bill on the distribution of the basic school fund. The resignation of Mrs. Amy Kesterson Foss, music instructor at Pelican school, was accepted. Mrs. Foss is changing residence. Mrs. Margaret Larkin was named to half-time assignment at KUHS, two classes in business training, one in junior English.
