

High Court Ponders Coal Case

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—The nine highest jurists in this country today set about deciding whether the government had any legal right to halt John L. Lewis' oil court last November as a strike breaking gesture.

It may be weeks before the supreme court announces its findings, but the justices themselves may know by Saturday what the answer will be, along with the one to this second question:

Will Lewis and his AFL United Mine Workers have to pay all or any of the \$5,100,000 in fines assessed against them for contempt of court?

Saturday is the day of the next regular conference of the nine justices. If each has made up his mind by then, Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson will assign one of them to write the court's opinion.

That task usually requires several weeks. The court's next opinion day is Monday, but another will not be due until February 3. That is the earliest date a decision appears possible.

The tribunal wound up three hours of arguments on the historic case late yesterday.

Senate Opens Labor Hearing

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—Chairman Taft (R-Ohio) announced today that the senate labor committee will open a "consolidated hearing" on all pending labor proposals January 23. The goal is to have some legislation ready about March 1, he said.

Taft said this program was unanimously agreed upon at an organization meeting of the senate labor committee.

The Ohio senator told reporters the hearing will first touch upon the comprehensive labor bill offered jointly by Senators Taft, Ball (R-Minn.) and Smith (R-N.J.) and a proposal by Senator Murray (D-Mont.) and eight other democrats for an overall study of labor problems by a commission composed of congressmen and public representatives named by the president.

Then, Taft continued, the hearing will consider "all other bills and resolutions having the object of reducing industrial strife in the United States."

Taft said this would include:

1. All bills dealing with organization and responsibility of labor unions.
2. Proposals for labor courts and compulsory arbitration.
3. Proposals for mediation and conciliation.
4. Proposals regarding the closed shop and nation-wide collective bargaining.
5. Bills amending the national labor relations act.

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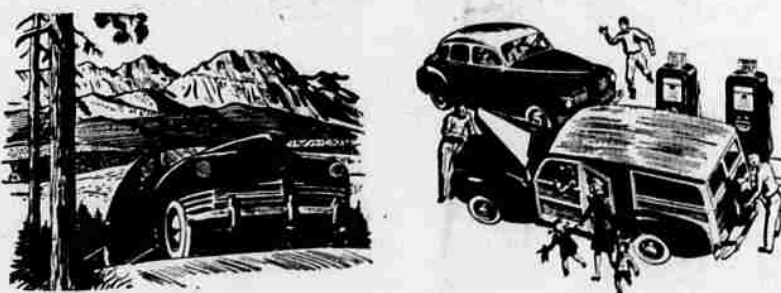
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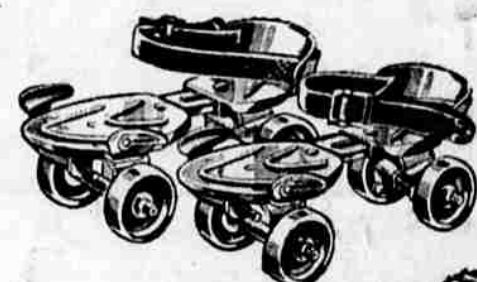
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
