Hood River Or Roseburg Sought As Gridiron Foe On Vacant Date

This current weather is not particularly conducive to football playing, but to keep the hot stove league supplied with fuel, Pelican Coach Ed Ryan has disclosed that the Pels have seven games plus an opening jamboree lined up for the 1947 season, and dickering is going on for another game.

Eugene has been cut off the Pelican football list. Ryan and Joe Peak, athletic supervisor, said that cancellation of the series with the Axemen has been confirmed all the way around and that the hook is out of the schedule.

## 'Cats Tip Hornets

Leading the game all the way, the KUHS Wildcats earned their first victory of the season in three starts by dropping the rough-and-tumble Henley Hornets 27-25 on the Pelican court Tuesday night. The Klamathites capitalized on Henley rebounds in the first quarter to grab a 10-3 lead, but went off the floor at the half with only an 11-13 margin. Third period ended 21-19 for the Wildcats.

The 'Cats held a 6 to 0 lead over the Hornets for four minutes of the opening stanza, until Vince Bodner made a point for Henley from the foul line. Fourteen fouls were whistled, eight for Klamath, six for the Hornets.

Fred Hess, Henley center and captain, led the scoring with 13. For the 'Cats, Skip Johnson and Jim Brown looped six apiece. The Wildcats have lost two previous games, to Malin and the Pelican Jayvees.

In a preliminary tilt, the KUHS frosh also garnered their first win, bouncing the Henley "B" squad 20-16. The half ended 8 to 4 in the Rocks' favor. Wayne Gober, of Henley, and Joe Demetrakos, of KUHS, each dropped seven points.

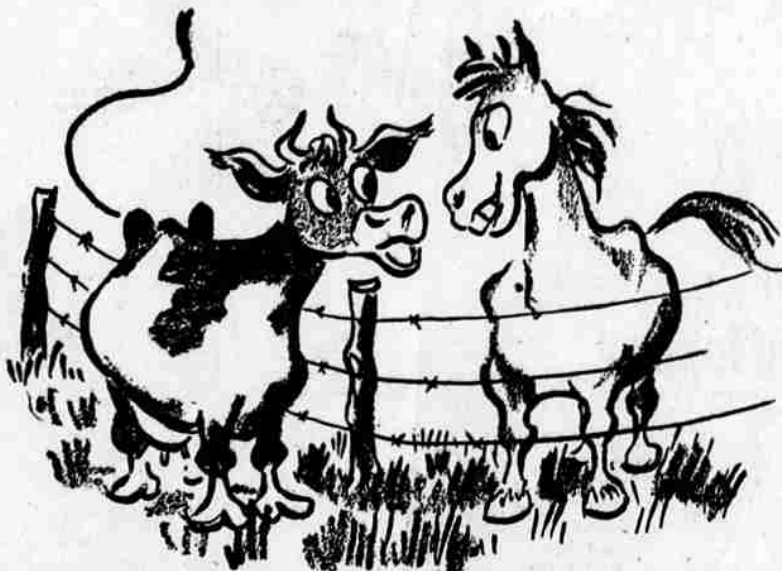

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# Football Job-Swapping Goes On

NEW YORK, Jan. 15 (AP)—Post-season job-swapping in the ranks of college football coaches continued today to provide many teams with new pigskin tutors.

The big turnover involving more than a score of resignations since the 1946 season, hit a new one-day high yesterday when three berths were filled—

making six additions to the nation's coaching ranks in less than a week.

A long-expected shift took place at the University of Alabama, where the ailing Frank Thomas stepped down to make room for Harold (Red) Drew, who resigned on Monday as head coach at Mississippi.

Thomas will continue as athletic director.

Drew, end coach at Alabama before entering the service in 1942, was Thomas' choice as his successor. A veteran coach at 52, Drew previously tutored at Trinity college and Birmingham-Southern and joined Thomas as an assistant at Chattanooga. He was one of the first assistants Thomas chose when the latter went to Alabama in 1931. Thomas had produced six bowl eleven in 16 seasons.

Drew's successor at Ole Miss is John H. Vaughn, all-America guard at Texas Christian in 1932, promoted from line coach of the Rebels and given a four-year contract. James (Buster) Poole, an end for the New York Giants, was named end coach and three other members of the coaching staff were retained.

Vaughn, formerly line coach at North Carolina and of two service teams during the war, takes over a team which won only two of nine games last season.

The University of Oregon named James W. Aiken, football coach and director of athletics at Nevada since 1939, to replace Gerald A. (Tex) Oliver as head coach.

Kansas state announced it was seeking two men to fill the dual position of head coach and athletic director vacated by Hobbs Adams. Adams resigned as coach at the end of the season and this week announced he would not renew his contract as athletic director. The board of regents then decided to divorce the two jobs.

Two other colleges took in the "help wanted" shingle last Friday after finding men for the jobs. Ed McKeever, who had resigned from Cornell, went to the University of San Francisco, and

George K. (Lefty) James was named to the vacancy at Cornell.

On Saturday Bob Woodruff, line coach at Georgia Tech, was named to succeed Fran Kimbrough as head coach at Baylor. Yesterday, Ray Graves, former line coach at Tennessee, was chosen to fill Woodruff's old job.

Still seeking coaches are Maryland, where T-master Clark Shaughnessy quit for the second time; Colby, where Danny Lewis resigned; Colgate, where the veteran Andy Kerr retired; and the University of California, where Frank Wickhorst stepped down.

## Summers Hoop Team Formed

Max Marvin, statistician for the county circuit, reports that the Chiloquin Panthers and Henley Hornets are as yet undefeated in county league play, with three wins each, and the two squads do not get together until January 31.

Sacred Heart and Gilchrist each have two league victories against one loss. Malin and Bonanza have records of one and two, while Merrill and Bly have yet to win a game that counts on the county schedule.
