

NY Pastor Slated To Speak Here

Dr. Frederick W. Evans, moderator of the 158th general assembly of the Presbyterian church, and pastor of the Second Presbyterian church, Troy, N. Y., will be in Klamath Falls Wednesday, January 22.

Few men in the Presbyterian church have served as widely throughout the United States as Dr. Evans. Since his ordination in 1905, he has been a pastor in all sections of the country where the church has numerous parishes.

In 1923, he traveled widely in Europe, and in 1936, he traveled in the Near East, visiting Palestine, Syria, Lebanon, Turkey and Egypt. He also visited Russia and made a cruise in the Mediterranean. Having had opportunity for close observation of the Arab-Jewish situation in Palestine, Dr. Evans has been watching with keen interest the struggle now in progress there.

He received his M. A. degree upon graduation from Washington and Jefferson college in 1906. From 1902 to 1904, Dr. Evans was a student at Western Theological seminary, and in 1904-1905, he concluded his theological studies at Princeton Theological seminary.

He received his doctor of divinity degree from Bellevue college, now affiliated with University of Omaha, in 1915.

Dr. Evans will deliver an address at a dinner meeting which will be held in the basement of the First Presbyterian church at 6 p. m., January 22. Presbyterians from the entire basin have been invited. Information regarding tickets may be obtained by phoning the church office at 7311.

Auriol Named French Head

PARIS, Jan. 17 (AP)—Vincent Auriol, veteran socialist leader, Thursday was elected president of the fourth French republic at Versailles palace.

An unofficial count gave Auriol 542 votes with 242 going to the MRP candidate Auguste Champetier de Ribes, 122 to Jules Gasser of the radical socialists and 60 to Michel Clemenceau, son of the Old Tiger of France representing the PRL.

The communists did not advance a candidate, but supported Auriol.

The voting was by the combined houses of the new parliament—the national assembly and the council of the republic.

It was the second honor in two days for Auriol, 62, long known as a peacemaker in French politics. He was chosen Tuesday as president of the national assembly.

The left and center stood and applauded vigorously when Jacques Duclos, vice president of the assembly, announced the choice of Auriol as the first popularly chosen and regularly elected president of France since 1940.

Mrs. Walter Denton of Salem, widely known in Oregon music circles and historian for the State Federation of Music club for many years and head of the Oregon committee for National Music week since institution of the annual observance 20 years ago, died at a Salem hospital Monday.

Portland Asks Alaska Trade

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 17 (AP)—A campaign to gain Alaskan business for Portland will open next week.

Charles L. Rouse, vice president of the East Side Commercial club, will fly to Juneau to lay groundwork for the visit of some 40 businessmen in about six weeks.

Rouse said they would present their products at a series of banquets in Alaska cities. If successful, this visit would be followed by another next summer, with 150 businessmen traveling in a chartered vessel.

Chairman of the club's new Alaskan trade committee, Rouse said he was aiming at getting for Portland 10 per cent of the Alaskan trade, which he estimated at \$150,000,000 annually. Most of it now is handled through Seattle.
