Eastern Milk Price Reduced One Cent

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 (AP)—The agriculture department announced today that it is ordering a reduction of approximately one cent a quart on producer prices of milk in five large northeastern metropolitan areas. The order will be effective February 1.

The areas are metropolitan New York, Philadelphia, Boston, Lowell-Lawrence, Mass., and Fall River, Mass.

The reduction is in line, officials said, with a normal decline at this time of the year when milk production starts a seasonal increase that reaches its peak in May and June.

State Rests Case Against Soldier

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 17 (AP)—The state was expected today to rest its case against Armando Joseph Grieco, 22, Fort Lewis, Wash., soldier charged with first-degree murder.

The prosecution introduced witnesses yesterday who were in a beer tavern last October when Grieco is accused of stabbing his wife fatally. They testified they saw him stab her several times.

Defense Attorney Wight L. Schwab indicated Grieco's plea would be temporary insanity.

Modoc County May Join TB Hospital

YREKA, Jan. 17—A possibility that Modoc county may join the proposed four-county tuberculosis hospital to be located at Redding has delayed final acceptance of the plan by members of the boards of supervisors of Siskiyou, Lassen and Trinity counties.

At a meeting of representatives of the four counties in Redding last week-end, Dr. E. F. Auble of Alturas, new chairman

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of the Modoc supervisors board, county district attorney, was directed to delay preparing the final agreement until the Modoc county officials give their decision.

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
