Out of the 20,000 high school graduates in Oregon each year, about 2000 go on to college, but some 4000 would take additional training in some specific field if it were available. Also included in the project would probably be extension courses from the two Oregon colleges.

It is expected to start with an enrollment of 400, to be gradually increased to 1500 in five years. Since many of these courses would not be extensive and necessitate long training periods, a large number of students could be trained in a year.

Mr. Teale believes there is a vast need for this type of additional educational facilities, not only for Oregon students, but for the entire northwest.
