

Parking Meters Slated To Start Operating Saturday

Klamath citizens will begin putting their nickels and pennies in the new parking meters next Saturday morning at 9 o'clock.

The ordinance providing for the regulation and maintenance of the meters was passed for a third and final reading by the city council last night and City Engineer E. A. Thomas told the council that he would have the meters installed and ready for operation before Saturday.

The meters will extend along Main from 2nd to 11th, on Klamath and Pine from 4th to 11th, and on the numbered streets from 4th to 11th between Klamath and Pine.

Also passed for a third and final reading by the council was the ordinance providing for the control and operation of Klamath Memorial park, the city's new cemetery.

Councilman A. F. Condrey brought up the subject of installation of a public comfort station in the downtown area for the convenience of shoppers. The mayor stated that some consideration had been given to the project in the past. It was also stated that the county had decided to provide such a facility. The mayor was asked by the council to get together with the city engineer and appoint a committee to make a thorough study of the problem.

Charlie Schuss appeared before the council in regard to his application for a permit to operate a card room at Schuss' tavern. Councilman Angus Newton, chairman of the police committee, asked for the council to recess for a few moments while he and Councilmen W. D. Miller and Wendell Smith, the other members of the committee, held a private meeting with Chief Hamilton to consider the request. The committee returned with the recommendation that before the permit be granted a thorough study and revision of the city's card room ordinance be made. The pres-

ent ordinance controls only the number of card rooms along Main street, Newton explained, and the committee felt that a revision should be made to control the number of card rooms in the entire city.

City Engineer E. A. Thomas recommended to the council that the mayor be empowered to write a letter to the state highway commission thanking them and offering the city's gratitude for the work done on improving S. 6th street.
