

# Ways, Means Committee To Probe Liquor Profit

SALEM, Jan. 22 (AP)—The legislative ways and means committee began an investigation of state liquor profits today, as the senate labor and industries committee introduced three labor-sponsored bills to almost double unemployment compensation benefits.

The ways and means committee is trying to find out how much liquor profits will be during the next two years so it can determine funds available for old age pensions. The commission estimated these profits at \$14,988,860, compared with the state budget division's estimate of \$29,423,665.

Commission auditors told the committee yesterday it has a \$16,420,910 inventory, which, if it were mostly good liquor, would forecast a large profit. So the committee asked the com-

# Britain Okays Burma Move

LONDON, Jan. 22 (AP)—Britain has agreed conditionally to the incorporation of the frontier provinces of Burma within the independent Burma state now being created, a government source said today.

The conditions stipulated will safeguard the rights of the people living in those frontier provinces, he said, because they are not in the same stage of development as the inhabitants of the rest of the country.

Britain had planned originally to partition the 260,000-square-mile country. The frontier provinces were to have continued under colonial administration. The present decision to incorporate the frontier provinces thus represents a reversal of policy.

Prime Minister Atlee and British cabinet ministers conducting the independence talks with the Burmese delegation in London are "satisfied" with the progress so far made, the government source said.

# Vatican Asks War Relief

ROME, Jan. 22 (AP)—The U. S. claims commission is investigating claims against the allies for bomb damage to Vatican state property at Castel Gandolfo and the little republic of San Marino, it was learned today.

While the Vatican listed property damage at approximately 170,000,000 lire, the tiny republic in east-central Italy petitioned for unspecified "relief" from "useful damages to the republic of San Marino."

It was not clear whether the Vatican claim was computed on the former official rate of 100 to the dollar or the current rate of 225. At the former rate the total damage—if paid—would amount to \$1,700,000. At the new value it would be \$755,550.

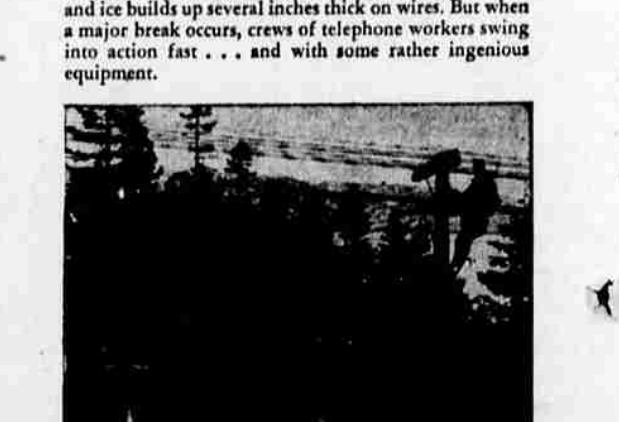
