## Umpqua Sales Top Million

Timber sales totaling \$1,185,240 in value were awarded to successful timber bidders during 1947 on the Umpqua national forest. The total volume involved 186,616,000 feet of Douglas fir, pine and other species, according to a report prepared by M. M. Nelson, forest supervisor. The average price per thousand feet was \$6.24, while the highest price bid was \$13.55 for pine species on a sale near Diamond lake, made to the Klamath Lake Moulding company.

The sales made during 1946 far exceeded the amount actually cut during the year, which indicates a trend of the lumber industry into the southern Oregon district. Several of the operators who purchased timber have been
