

### Steps in the Training of a Good Hunting Companion

There's nothing like a good dog to add pleasure and profit to the hunt. But good dog companions don't just happen; practically without exception they are the products of long, conscientious training in the demands of the woods and fields. Some of the steps in the training of a good gun dog are here illustrated by Elias C. Fall, widely known trainer of field dogs and director of the Gaines Research Kennels, Ridgefield, Conn.



"NO!" is one of the most valuable commands in preventing waste motion in hunting. A dog who will restrain from eating when commanded "No" is well on the way toward being well trained.



"HEEL!" This command keeps the dog at his master's side ready for any contingency. Pointers and Setters "heel" on the right side while Retrievers walk on their master's left side.



"COME!" is the first step in training a field dog. He learns from repeated tugs on a long lead and from pats when he obeys.



"WHOA!" Picking the dog up and then planting him down firmly on all four feet while restraining him from moving is the best way to teach him to stop in his tracks on this command.



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FIELD TRIAL DOGS are run in braces. Exuberant dogs HOLDING a point until a gun is fired is taught by having to be held back until they learn to stand without a long one man tug. The bird while another holds the dog lead while waiting for the starting signal.



After the gun is fired the dog is allowed to run to the lead while waiting for the starting signal.

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## Pelicans Earn 5th League Win

### Surprising Grants Pass Team Beaten 64-48 After Nearly Upsetting Cart

The Pelicans nearly got their feathers singed last night by a fighting Grants Pass basketball team, but managed to get together for 24 points in the final quarter to five for the Cavemen and win 64-48, the fifth consecutive conference victory for the Pels.

Grants Pass struggled on even terms with the Klamathites for two stanzas, then put on a thrilling burst of speed in the third quarter to take a 43-40 lead at the end of that frame and put the Pels in a very bad light.

Then the Pelican second string of Bob Redkey, Don Zarosin-Chuck Heilbrunner were tossed into the fray and literally wrenched the game away from Grants Pass with speed, daring and good shooting.

Grants Pass grabbed an early lead in the first quarter, but it changed hands seven times and not until halfway through the stanza were the Pelicans able to pull to a comparatively safe margin, 13-8. The locals led 18-14 when the buzzer sounded.

The valley boys came close to topping the Pelicans' lead several times in the second frame, but, managing to stay ahead all the way, Klamath also held the halftime lead, 30-25. The third period proved the downfall of the Klamath team, and Grants Pass took advantage of the Pels to put the score at 43-40, in favor of the Cavemen. Burning up the court, the Geepes dropped 18 points through the net in the third frame.

Klamath scored 26 field goals and completed 12 out of 21 free throws during the evening, while Grants Pass hit 14 out of 24 charity tries.

In preliminary game the Pelican junior varsity easily clipped the Grants Pass Jayvees.

The two teams hook up in another duel tonight at 8:15, and in the preliminary tilt Chiloquin, leading team in the County Basketball league, will play the Wildcats, starting at 7 o'clock.

Pro Football May Accept Portland bid  
CHICAGO, Jan. 25 (AP)—Rufus Klawans sees a great future for the Pacific Coast Pro Football league, of which he is president, and is planning an expansion program to include Portland and Spokane in the northwest.

This should come as somewhat a relief to those members in the circuit who were prone to think otherwise when one of their top clubs, the San Francisco Clippers, put in a surprise bid yesterday at the National Football league meeting for a franchise. The request was promptly tabled with NFL Commissioner Bert Bell declaring that his league will keep its present 10-club membership for "three or four years."

There is no question but that we have our coast league in mind at all times, said Klawans. "If the Clippers' franchise should ever be accepted by the National league the club would start up a farm team in Oakland to keep coast league football in the bay region.

"With the increase in populations on the west coast, the future of our league is bright and the trend undoubtedly will be to add more teams—Portland and Spokane—and split the league into two divisions. This would aid us in solving a traveling problem which has been our main stumbling block.

"We were especially impressed by the good showing last season of Salt Lake City, which entered the league for the first time, and the Honolulu Warriors. Our league meeting will be in San Francisco February 15 and 16, and any problems will be ironed out."

Panthers Top Bly, 60-32  
CHILOQUIN, Jan. 25 — Continuing as the only undefeated squad in the county league, the Chiloquin Panthers overpowered Bly last night in a league game, 60 to 32.

The Panthers have won every league and practice game gone into this season, and are pointing for a meeting with the Henley Hornets, also undefeated in conference play. The Hornets have lost three non-conference clashes.

Last night the Panther first team played only one quarter, then retired to rest up for a meeting with the KUHWS Wildcats on Pelican court last night.

Score at the end of the first quarter was 24-2. Hatcher counted 10 points for the Panthers, Fagan of Bly had 17 tallies. Bly's 32 points represented the highest score made against Chiloquin this year. Chiloquin also won the B game, 63-14.

State Is Asked To Clear Weeds  
PORTLAND, Jan. 25 (AP)—Sportsmen's groups voted last night to ask the state legislature to finance weed eradication from Tahkenitch and Siltcoos lakes on the Oregon coast.

They estimated the project would cost nearly \$200,000 with annual re-treatments costing 5 per cent of the original sum.

Sportsmen said a rapidly spreading Brazilian weed in the lakes threatened to make them useless for swimming or boating.

A committee meeting was called for Monday to draft a bill. Sponsorship of the game committees of the house and senate will be sought.

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## Louis Wants Bout That'll Pack 'Em In

### Joe Louis, casually choosing an apple 10 minutes before starting a workout, has a definite nomination for the next defense of his heavyweight championship.

"I don't care who I fight, just so he's the one that'll draw the most money," he decided, after thinking it over a full moment—and quattering the apple with one bite.

The champ, who looked pretty good despite the fact he weighs nearly 218 pounds, is getting ready for a tour of Mexico and Central America, boxing a series of exhibitions.

The first is set for February 5 at Mexico City with Arturo Godoy.

His trainer, Mennie Seaman of New York, looked askance at the apple and the clock, and more than 1000 railbirds waited outside to see the Bomber spar and punch the bag, Louis went on:

"I'm s'posed to fight in New York June 28. I reckon it'll be with the winner of the Baski Woodcock fight in London in February," Louis calls Joe Baski "Baski." He went on:

"Baski is all right, I guess. But Woodcock would draw better. It'd give the fight something—yea, an international angle. That might do a million dollars.

"Those other fellas, Baski or Walcott—shucks, that'd only do about \$200,000."

What about Bruce Woodcock, the Englishman?  
"I saw him fight in New York. He's all right. Kinda slow, but not bad."

And Jersey Joe Walcott, or Elmer (Violent) Ray?  
Joe didn't hesitate. "Not them. They stunk the Garden out when they fought."

So saying, Joe Louis leisurely began his workout preparations. And Mennie Seaman eyed with suspicion a well done-up apple core.

## OSC Whips Huskies; Webfoots Lose Again

SEATTLE, Jan. 25 (AP)—Oregon State, winner of 17 of 18 games this season, raced well ahead of the pack in northern division Pacific Coast conference basketball play today after an overwhelming win over Washington, but Washington State also had a winning streak under way.

The Beavers, beaten only by Long Island university this season, trounced Washington convincingly here last night 59 to 37 for a fifth conference victory against no defeats. At Pullman, Washington State won its fourth straight, defeating Oregon 51 to 37, and climbed to second place in the race with a five won, three lost record.

A midget guard, Lew Beck, dropped in 16 points to lead his team as Washington kept its eyes mainly on big Red Rocha, Oregon State center, who was held to eight points.

Cliff Crandall, a forward, counted 13 points and the best scoring effort by Washington was Forward Boody Gilbertson's eight.

The Washington pavilion, packed to overflowing and with a big new seating section opened, housed 13,500 spectators for the game, a new Pacific northwest basketball crowd record.

At Pullman, Washington State built up a good early lead and got out in front 28 to 23 at halftime and held it to the end. Bob Hamilton, Washington State guard, scored 12 to lead both teams.

The teams play again tonight.

## Ability System May Grade Punch-Drunks Out Of Ring

NEW YORK, Jan. 25 (AP)—The campaign to do away with fighters who wind up walking on their heels and hearing make-believe bells go off, took a new twist today with a proposal to have beak-busters graded like race horses—on proven ability—but without putting aluminum shoes on them or feeding them oats.

The idea came from Dr. C. B. Powell, member of the New York state athletic commission, and was given a considerable run-down at yesterday's weekly meeting of the commission, which has been campaigning pointedly for a year on getting punch-drunkness and punch-drunk fighters out of the ring.

The commission chairman, Eddie Egan, who revealed Wednesday that the licenses of 61 fighters were revoked last year because the commission didn't want them to "get hurt," likes the suggestion.

Dr. Powell's plan is to have the commission grade ear-scramblers under five classifications, depending on what they've done in the ring—and naturally what's been done to them.

When any clouter, except a champion, loses five in a row, he would fall down into the next lower grade, the commission proposes. And he can come back up only after he wins five in a string.

No match would be made between two thumpers in different classifications—except between champs and contenders—without special dispensation of the boxing commission.

## Tami Knocks Out Thomas In Two

DETROIT, Jan. 25 (AP)—Tami Mauriello kept his heavyweight opponent John Thomas on the floor during a large share of their brief two-round encounter last night as he scored his second technical knockout of the New York negro.

Seven knockdowns—four in the first round and three in the second—were administered by the Bronx bulldozer before Referee Lou Handler stopped the scheduled 10-rounder after two minutes and 45 seconds of the second frame.

A crowd of 9725 paid \$23,724 for exactly the kind of battle it expected as Mauriello, weighing in at 201 to 194 for Thomas, practically duplicated his third round TKO of the New Yorker scored here last March.

## Altamont Wins Bruins Troupe Bears For Tie

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 25 (AP)—A 52-45 victory over the California Bears last night gave UCLA's Bruins a tie for the southern division lead in Pacific Coast conference basketball and a chance to pull ahead of the Bears in tonight's game.

The artful Bruins gave their Berkeley cousins their first breath-taking long shots by Freshman Johnny Stanich.

The former Sacramento star dunked eight field goals, all from more than 25 feet out.

USC and Stanford, other members of the southern division, passed up league play for the week-end. Stanford out-spaced San Francisco Olympic club 45-40 in a Palo Alto clash.

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
