School Board Takes Action

Routine business including the naming of two teachers to fill vacancies in the city school system, took up the time of both boards of district 1 and 2, in session Monday night. Mrs. Helen Johnson, who has had previous teaching experience in California, will take over the fifth first grade at Mills, and Mrs. Coramae Fenning, former Nebraska teacher, will instruct in the second grade at Pelican where conditions made it necessary to divide that classroom.

Superintendent Arnold L. Gralapp advised the boards that a new boiler was being installed at Mills school. The boards established the tuition policy in relation to the Saturday afternoon art classes for grade youngsters at KUHS.

Charles McLin was named to two periods of general science at KUHS, relieving Joe LaClair who will devote full time to audio-visual education. McLin spends the remainder of the day at Fremont junior high where he is dean of boys and physical education instructor. The boards continued the study of teacher salaries and heard a report from Garry Robertson, chairman of the teachers salary committee. The boards rejected a proposal made by Ralph L. Morgan, state supervisor of agricultural education, for participation on farm training in agriculture for veterans. The remainder of the session was spent in studying with A. W. Heston, clerk, a report on bond and serial levy funds.

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Police Search Man's Family

The body of John Stevenson Colette, 31-year-old night club entertainer who was killed in a plane crash January 13 near Marysville, Calif., remains unclaimed in a Marysville morgue and authorities again appealed to the Herald and News to locate the man's wife Alice, thought to be here or in Lakeview.

A call was received late Monday afternoon by The Herald and News from the newsroom of the Marysville Appeal-Democrat, advising that Colette's body has not been buried and no trace of any relatives could be found. All of the entertainer's personal belongings were apparently in the plane which crashed in Nevada county close to the Yuba county line. Colette appeared here as "Johnny Stevens" at Lakeshore Inn during the holiday season but left just before Christmas to fill an engagement as master of ceremonies at the Casablanca club in Marysville. It is understood that Colette was en route to Klamath Falls "to meet his wife Alice," leaving the Marysville airport under protest of officials there due to weather conditions. Alice has not been heard from.

Carnival Marble Cake
