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Snow Causes Basin Pileups

Highways throughout this area continued slippery today and numerous minor accidents were reported from snow covered stretches. One fatality occurred on the Willamette pass early Tuesday as a result of snow conditions, officers reported.

Sub-freezing temperatures throughout the basin were reported today, the weatherman giving 18 at 3:30 a. m. Snow was falling lightly in the northern section of Klamath county, the Southern Pacific advising that more than five inches of snow covers the ground at Crescent Lake and points in that district. The line is operating satisfactorily at this end but No. 29, due in at 11:30 a. m., was more than one hour late, hampered by snow conditions at Dunsuir where 14 inches of snow covers that area and "still falling." Temperatures to the north ranged from 18 to 32, minimum.

Ten inches of new snow fell on Sun Mountain pass, eight inches of new snow was reported on the Green Springs highway and at Odell lake seven inches fell on top of 51 inches of a roadside pack. A section of one-way traffic near Salt Creek falls will be cleared late today, the state highway department said.

A detour five miles north of Klamath Falls was also expected to be cleared late today, the detour necessary for culvert installation.

Child Guidance Speaker Heard

Allen East of the child guidance clinic, University of Oregon, was the featured speaker at a Tuesday night meeting of the Klamath county child care, health and welfare committee, and gave a report on the shortage of trained personnel needed to carry on the child guidance work in Oregon.

Members of the committee discussed several measures which have been presented to the state legislature, with an eye to receiving backing for the measure from various civic organizations. Fred B. Robinson, member of the city recreation committee, told of the need for a recreation program here such as was in operation in the years immediately preceding the war.

Robinson said that at that time Klamath county's recreation program was among the finest in the state, having at one time nine paid directors. He also stressed the need to find a director to replace E. E. Hambrick, resigned.

British Farm Bill Assured Passage

LONDON, Jan. 29 (P)—Passage of the labor government's new agriculture bill, designed to guarantee prices and markets for British farmers, virtually assured of enactment today after successfully passing its decisive second reading in the house of commons.

The bill, described by the laborites as the "farmers' magna carta," still faces a third reading, but this—under British parliamentary procedure—is little more than a formality.

The two-day debate which preceded the second reading last night produced some adverse criticism by the conservatives, but they did not push their objections strongly and the measure was approved without a record vote.
