

Vet's Mail Bag

As a service to veterans in the community, this newspaper will publish a weekly column of questions most frequently asked concerning the Veterans Administration in this area. For detailed information, veterans should contact or write to the nearest VA contact unit.

Q. Can I pay my National Service Life Insurance premiums at the Veterans Administration contact office?

A. No. Contact offices are not authorized to accept remittances for insurance premiums. Payments may be made in person at the regional office in your state or mailed to:

Q. I was captured by the enemy during World War II and was in a prisoner of war camp for 15 months but my claim for disability was denied by the Veterans Administration. Why?

A. I now feel that the disability is getting worse? The Veterans Administration will give special consideration to disability claims filed by veterans interned in enemy prison camps. You should get in touch with your nearest VA office and have your case re-opened.

Q. May I transfer part of my eligibility for education and training to my wife who is also a veteran but who does not have sufficient entitlement to complete her college course?

A. No. A wife, even though she is a veteran, cannot use any part of her husband's entitlement under the G. I. Bill provisions.

Q. Am I entitled to field trip expenses in traveling material for this while I am in school under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act?

A. Veterans Administration will not pay for occasional field trips, whether to a summer camp or for data for research or thesis, where the charge to the student is a separate charge not included in the tuition or laboratory fee customarily paid by all students enrolled in the course.

Q. How may application be made for domiciliary or hospital care of a veteran?

A. Veterans Administration Form P-10 "Application for Hospital Treatment or Domiciliary Care," should be executed by the veteran or nearest relative, guardian or representative, and forwarded to the nearest VA hospital, regional office, or contact office. If found to be eligible for admission, the veteran will be promptly notified and if admission cannot be authorized, the veteran will be included and the reason stated.

Q. Must property, to be a guaranteed loan, be covered by insurance?

A. It is customary for lenders to require insurance on buildings against which loans are made in order to protect themselves against loss of security. This also protects the veteran since it may provide funds to replace the loss. Buildings used as security for loans which carry the guaranty of the VA must be insured against fire and other hazards against which it is customary to insure in the community.

Stocks Keep Forward Gain

NEW YORK, Jan. 29 (AP)—Stocks pushed ahead today for the sixth time in seven market sessions, and at the close many leaders held gains ranging from fractions to about 2 points. A few volume jumps ranged to more than 8 points.

Steel and some other metals were prominent in the advance, but improvement spread to most industrials and several rails. Irregularity prevailed in sluggish foreign exchange, but a steady volume of transactions to near the best of the month at approximately 1.40 cents.

American Telephone was a notable exception to the advance, being unchanged from its previous close. Widened gains were registered by United States Steel, International Harvester, Chrysler, International Paper, Dow Chemical, American Can, Union Pacific, and others.

General Motors, Ford, and Chrysler were among the most active. General Motors advanced 1/4 point to 48 1/2, Ford 1/4 to 37 1/2, and Chrysler 1/4 to 34 1/2.

Oil stocks were also active. Standard Oil of New York advanced 1/4 to 41 1/2, and Gulf Oil 1/4 to 38 1/2.

Government bonds were steady. The 2 1/2% coupon U.S. Treasury note advanced 1/4 to 101 1/2, and the 3% coupon U.S. Treasury note advanced 1/4 to 102 1/2.

Foreign exchange was steady. The dollar advanced 1/4 to 150 1/2, and the pound advanced 1/4 to 160 1/2.

Commodity prices were mixed. Wheat advanced 1/4 to 1.40, and corn advanced 1/4 to 1.20.

Gold prices were steady. The price of gold was 133 1/2.

Stock prices were generally higher. The Dow Jones Industrial Average advanced 10 points to 220.

The market was characterized by a steady advance in most sectors, with some volatility in the afternoon.

Investors were generally optimistic, and trading volume was heavy.

The market closed with a strong upward bias, and many stocks reached new highs.

Analysts expect continued growth in the economy, and a rise in stock prices.

The market is expected to remain strong in the near future.

Investors should continue to hold their positions.

The market is expected to continue its upward trend.
