Today's Roundup

OPINION is strong among school officials and others here that the plan for distributing the state's basic school fund, presently advanced but not yet adopted at the legislature, needs to be simplified.

That opinion was strengthened a few days ago when M. B. Winslow, Grants Pass school superintendent and a member of the state committee which devised the proposed distribution formula, miscalculated to the extent of about \$175,000 on the effect of the distribution on local school districts. He was here for a discussion of the question with school boards.

Re-figuring after Mr. Winslow left, school officials here detected what they believed to be a miscalculation, got in touch with Mr. Winslow, and he agreed that a correction should be made.

Mr. Winslow was one of a state committee which worked out the formula, another member of that committee being Dr. C. L. Huffaker of the University of Oregon school of education. In legislative circles, the formula is generally credited to Dr. Huffaker.

There is feeling at Salem as well as here that a formula for distribution of the money, estimated to be about \$16,000,000, should be at least understandable to the layman, something which can hardly be said for the Huffaker proposal. It appears likely that another and simpler plan for the distribution will be devised and offered to the legislature.

SCHOOL officials said here that so near as they can figure, Klamath Falls elementary district will break about even, Klamath Union high school district will gain to the extent of about \$62,000, and the county district will gain to some extent if elementary and high school departments are figured separately.

Much opposition is coming from Multnomah county, which thinks it should get considerably more than the formula indicates. There is also opposition in the counties along the Union Pacific in northeastern Oregon which, because of high valuation, are not likely to gain from the application of the Huffaker formula.

One criticism of the plan that has been advanced here is that it takes into consideration assessed valuations, which vary widely in various counties. Observers foresee further variance and competitive assessing among the counties in an effort to fare better under the rule, if that factor is made part of the distribution formula. Local officials indicate favor to a plan which would take into consideration average daily attendance and teacher units as the main basis for distribution of the money.

Lake Reports One Accident

One injury was reported from Crater Lake national park Sunday where 153 cars brought 654 persons into the winter sports area during the day. The World Today

The first national congress of those whose slogan is "the brotherhood of man and the federation of the world" as a practical objective will convene February 21 at Asheville, N. C.

The congress has been called by the United States council of the movement for world government, and is being sponsored by a dozen organizations. They have invited representatives from a score of other national organizations which are on record as favoring the idea, including the American veterans committee, the commission of world peace of the Methodist church, the U. S. Junior chamber of commerce, various bar associations and the like.

The United States council was organized after an international meeting in Luxembourg last October, and is designed to unify the movement in this country.

World-wide Attention

The idea seems to have attracted world-wide attention since the war, has received strong support in England, and is a long-range objective of some who support such groups as union now, which seeks immediate federation of England with the United States, and the proposed United States of Europe. A recent public opinion poll in the United States (by Roper) indicated that more than 60 per cent of Americans support the federalists, believing this country should join a representative world congress empowered to make and enforce laws.

Some of the people who are advocating world federation want it to replace the United Nations now. Others realize that, considering the present state of the world, their lifetimes will at

Still others feel that the most practical immediate approach is through confederation—a non-legislative combination of countries to promote peace and mutual welfare. Many of them would like to see the U. S. and the British commonwealth begin it with treaties calling for customs union, military alliance and cultural support, and with this union thrown open for membership by any other countries which would support the same tenets. They believe such a union would soon become sufficiently strong to enforce peace by the mere promise to step in on the side of the underdog

whenever the need arose. This is the same line of thought that held that England, the U. S. and France, could have prevented the Ethiopian, Sino-Japanese and second World wars by an alliance which promised to whip anyone who started a fight.
