

## Eugene Man To Speak Here

## Post Office Work Slowed

The big orange tank on the post office lawn for the last few weeks, which has aroused curiosity of patrons, is the fuel storage tank for the oil burning heating system now being installed in the federal building, according to Burt E. Hawkins, postmaster.

Hawkins explained that the new heating system was ordered installed several months ago after the rates for commercial steam, by which the building is now heated, had become prohibitive. Now, he said, the price is reasonable once more, but the system will be installed anyway for use as an auxiliary and reserve to the regular steam system.

Hawkins added that the tank has been on the lawn for some time and that the contract for installation had been let, but is now overdue. He said he didn't know when the work would get underway.

## Young Romeo Looks For Job

LAS VEGAS, Nev., Feb. 6 (AP)—Ellsworth (Sonny) Wisecarver, 18, who has been involved in romantic episodes with married women since he was 14, is looking for a job so he can marry a 16-year-old girl.

For eloping at 16 with the 25-year-old mother of two children, Wisecarver was remanded to a California state youth authority camp at Redding last year, but escaped and later obtained his freedom on a writ of habeas corpus at Ely, Nev.

Wisecarver declined to identify his prospective bride, but said she is a high school student. When he was 14 he eloped to Yuma, Ariz., with a 21-year-old mother of two children and married her. The marriage was annulled.

## Lake Chamber Asks Delay In School Fund Outlay

LAKEVIEW, Feb. 4 (Special)—A two-year delay in the putting in force of all collection of taxes and distribution of funds from the state's basic school law has been called for by the Lake County chamber of commerce.

In the event, however, that the legislature elects to place the law in force this year—to any greater extent than school support has been given by the state in the past—the chamber has called upon its legislators to seek, in addition to all other appropriations from the fund, a sum of twenty-five cents per acre per year for each acre of federally owned land in the various school districts, acquired since 1930.

These actions came Monday when the chamber endorsed recommendations from its education committee, headed by Gordon Smith. Smith pointed out that counties possessing vast tracts of federally-owned tax-free lands are entitled to some reimbursement in exactly the same manner as Multnomah county is seeking special appropriations from the basic school fund for Vanport city.

In view of the confusion, however, the hope was expressed that no efforts be made to place this basic school law into effect for the two-year period inasmuch as Smith said, as only four or five counties in the entire state approved the measure at last November's election. He added that only by such an appropriation as that for government land can eastern Oregon counties get anything like a "fair break" in distribution.

The chamber also took a position definitely opposing the passage of SB-20, which would make unlawful the running of stock on state highway rights-of-way. This measure is considered unworkable in the big livestock counties of eastern Oregon, unless provision is made by the highway commission to adequately fence all rights of way. HB-137, the proposed brand and inspection law, was approved.

Opposition also was voiced to HB-48, which would make unlawful the publication of names of debtors; SB-18, removing the payment for gravel taken for road purposes from navigable streams, and HB-61, to repeal the existing county school taxes. Both of the latter were opposed due to their taking away revenues from schools before the major question of school support is settled.

Other legislation disapproved included HB-47, a bill to reduce required school attendance from 12 to eight years, and efforts to substitute a gas pump license fee for the aviation tax. The chamber recently endorsed the proposal for a full 5c per gallon aviation tax for construction, maintenance and operation of

airports. Opposition was expressed to the county zoning bill, but no action was taken. Bills approved include HB-73 through 77, inclusive, dealing with powers and operations of the state board of aeronautics; HB-25 having to do with hunting and fishing licenses, and SB-80, allowing 10 per cent bonded indebtedness of school districts.

## Thief Robs Grocery Clerk

TACOMA, Feb. 6 (AP)—Before a lineup of women customers waiting for their groceries to be checked, a lone robber held up a Safeway grocery store here yesterday afternoon and escaped with an undisclosed sum from the cash registers.

The man, holding a handkerchief to his face and carrying a black automatic pistol, ordered two clerks at cash registers to "empty it out and put it in a bag."

"Some of the customers giggled, thinking it was a joke," Casner Roger Fisher said.

There were half a dozen women lined up checking their groceries, and a dozen other customers in the store.

The robber backed out the front door of the store with his pistol still aimed at the cashiers and escaped around a corner.

## Building Lid Still Tight

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 (AP)—Alarmed at a seemingly widespread belief that the lid is off construction, the government gave notice today that it will enforce rigidly the ban on unauthorized commercial building.

John C. Houston, commissioner of the civilian production administration, declared that any builder who starts a store, factory or other commercial job without a CPA permit is "letting himself in for difficulties when compliance officers check his project."

Houston told a reporter that CPA is tightening its construction controls by shifting compliance men to that field as controls are lifted from textiles, chemicals and other materials.

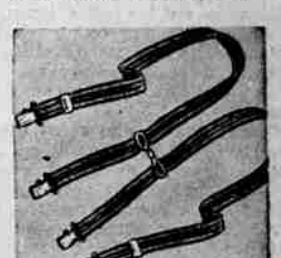
