Freight Rate Raise Rapped

At a recent hearing in Salem on the subject of freight rates, Paul Taylor on behalf of the Klamath Basin Rates Bureau, Inc., opposed any increase in motor carrier rates at this time, alleging that present rates from and to Klamath Falls are in excess of reasonable rates compared with rates between points in other territory.

He submitted as an exhibit in this proceeding a statement of the position of the bureau, along with a number of statements showing the rates between Klamath Falls and other points in Oregon compared with rates between various Oregon points, and between points in other states and points in Oregon; also between points in other states.

The statement submitted by Taylor contained the following: "We are not objecting to reasonable increases, as such, to meet increased carrier operating costs. But we are opposing increases on rates which are now—were before the 8 per cent increase of 1942, and the surcharge increase of 1946, unjust and unreasonable, unduly preferential to interstate shippers, and were and are now prejudicial and discriminatory to Klamath Falls and the Klamath basin area."

The commission promised to review individual rates.

State Racing Revenue Limited

SALEM, Feb. 6 (AP)—Attorney General George Neuner ruled today the county fairs cannot use their state racing revenues for capital outlays, since the money must be used only to pay maintenance expenses.

In another opinion, Neuner held that school boards cannot give authority to a board chairman and clerk to pay wages and bills, as this can be done only at regular board meetings.

Meter Fund Nets \$1271

A harvest of \$1271 has been gleaned in eight parking days from the 667 parking meters recently installed in downtown Klamath Falls, strengthening the argument for keeping the curbside gadgets.

The figure was released today by the city treasurer after the third collection which netted \$509. Result of the first collection was \$321 and the second collection added \$441 to the city coffers.

Count of coins collected shows persons are still inserting dimes which, according to the treasurer, is "just throwing money away." Pennies or nickels register but dimes do not, it was stated.

British Minister Of Education Dies At Age Of 49
LONDON, Feb. 6 (AP)—Pert, tiny, red-haired Ellen Wilkinson, 49, British minister of education, died today 24 hours after entering a hospital for treatment of bronchitis.

Her death, the first in Prime Minister Attlee's cabinet since it was formed in August, 1945, was attributed to a heart attack. She had been ill for months.

Incredibly hard-working, she was the second woman ever to serve in a British cabinet. Her most lasting contribution as a cabinet minister probably was her successful campaign to raise the age for leaving school from 14 to 15, a fight she won despite the opposition of fellow ministers and the acute need for young recruits for British industry.

Beginning next April, British children will be compelled to attend school until they are 15 years old.
