Group Talks Housing Here

Housing problems in Klamath Falls and how to solve them were discussed at the chamber of commerce Thursday evening by an interested assembly of about 70 people.

A practical solution to the problem was offered by Charles Elliott, assistant state director of federal housing administration, and Walter Hutchinson, zone attorney, both of Portland.

Liberal terms of the government financing system in effect now were explained by the two, whereby a prospective house purchaser may have the unit appraised by FHA and the FHA will back a bank loan to the purchaser. Up to 90 per cent of present construction costs will be loaned by FHA for construction of an apartment, flats or rental room building. Liberal loans are also offered for conversion of present buildings into rental units, it was explained by the representative from Portland.

With such a workable program, it should not be long before some builders in this vicinity get busy and take advantage of the offer, Elliott stated, predicting several new apartment houses in the next few months.

Friday morning Elliott and Hutchinson visited with Klamath Falls builders, contractors and architects, touring the city to look over the situation.

Wagner Arraignment Set Next Week

Circuit Judge Charles H. Combs of Lakeview, in town on legal matters today, told court officials that he would probably arraign Verne L. Wagner, Klamath police officer, in court a week from today. Wagner is free on \$3500 bail at present. He was indicted early in December for assault, armed with a dangerous weapon, in connection with an alleged prisoner-beating at the city jail.

Combs has been assigned to hear the case. He is now hearing default divorce cases and will return to Lakeview Saturday.

Spanish Air Crash Investigation On

AVILA, Spain, Feb. 7 (AP)—Investigators, stymied overnight by fog and darkness, planned scrutiny today of a wrecked four-engine Cuban airliner that had carried 10 persons to death—half of them crewmen from Miami, Fla.

The Ruta de Colon (Route of Columbus), DC-4 of the Compania Aerovias Cubana (Cuban Airways company), hit a foggy cliff late yesterday in the Gre-dos mountains 90 miles west of Madrid, exploded and burned, killing the three passengers and seven crewmen aboard.

Higgins Boat Company Cleared

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 7 (AP)—A federal grand jury has cleared the Andrew J. Higgins boat-building firm, after an investigation of its wartime activities.

United States District Attorney Herbert W. Christenberry issued this statement today:

"The grand jury which for some months has been investigating alleged violations of federal statutes by Higgins Industries, Inc., and its officials has completed its investigation and has concluded that there is no basis for criminal prosecution."

Ankeny Bail Cut Denied

A request for reduction of the set bail made by Lewis H. Ankeny and his attorney, Ben Anderson, was denied yesterday afternoon by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg.

Ankeny, former stockholder, has been indicted for embezzlement and larceny by bailie, and held in the county jail in lieu of \$10,000 bail, \$5000 on each charge.

When arraigned yesterday afternoon he asked that the bail be reduced to \$3000, but the motion was denied. District Attorney Clarence A. Humble said that he had no recommendation to make in the matter.

After the two indictments were read to Ankeny, he was given until March 3 to decide upon a plea.

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Unborn Baby Enters Case

SEATTLE, Feb. 7 (AP)—An unborn baby, a pawn in a divorce case, found a staunch defender in Superior Judge Roger J. Meakim today.

When Glenn H. Stokes, 21, war veteran seeking a default decree from his 20-year-old wife, Iva, testified yesterday he would pay towards the child's support but wanted to give it to her and another man she is interested in, Judge Meakim exclaimed:

"What is this, a lottery? I am not impressed by a man who won't fight for his own child."

His wife wants to marry the other man and he has given permission, Stokes said, for him to adopt the child after its expected birth in April. His parents, in Ellensburg, are unable to care for it and he can not do so himself.

"I will represent the child, and will take this case under advisement until after the baby is born," Judge Meakim ruled.

The Stokes were married at Ellensburg October 31, 1944.

Ella Raines Weds Army Major

HOLLYWOOD, Feb. 7 (AP)—Movie Actress Ella Raines and Maj. Robin Olds, son of the late Maj. Gen. Robert Olds, were honeymooning at Lake Tahoe today after their marriage last night at the Westwood Community church. Each is 25.

Olds is a former West Point football player and now commands a jet plane squadron at March field, Calif. Miss Raines was divorced from her first husband, Kenneth W. Trout, airline pilot who served in the army.

Unitarian church. It reads: "O Father of us all, Who are in the heavens! Thy name be hallowed! Thy kingdom come! Thy will be done! As in heaven so upon the earth. Our bread—the food of our eternal life, give us day by day. And forgive us our misdeeds, as we have forgiven those misdeeds which have been done against us. And never wouldst thou lead us into temptation; but rather deliver thou us from evil. Amen."
