Crater Lake Weather Good

Clear skies with a few scattered clouds covered the Crater Lake national park area today, promising fine weather for skiers and tourists.

The morning radio reports from the park indicated 100 inches of snow on the ground with an icy crust. Between 11 a. m. and 4 p. m. the skiing is reported good on the slopes, but unless there is a good fall of snow the trails will be rough and rutted.

The minimum temperature for the last 24 hours was 24 degrees, the maximum rose to 46. The thermometers read 27 degrees at 8:30 this morning.

Roads in the park are all clear and in good condition, the report said, and no chains are required. Drivers were urged to carry chains with them, however, in case of emergency.

Mayor Back From Meeting

Mayor Ed Ostendorf reported today that his two-day visit to the state capitol was very successful. The mayor said that he appeared before the state's sub-committee on aeronautics in relation to four bills pending before the legislature, to give his views on the legislation.

One of the principal bills to appear before the sub-committee was the one calling for reorganization of the state aeronautics board. The board is now composed of either airport managers or flyers with a certain amount of experience. The proposed change would give the cities having an investment in the

fields more representation on the board.

Also discussed was a new bill providing for planning and zoning around city airports, and a bill making it illegal to drop any article from an airplane flying over land. The mayor pointed out that the latter bill would prevent food from being dropped to wrecked or isolated persons and that his group from the League of Oregon Cities has recommended certain amendments to the act.

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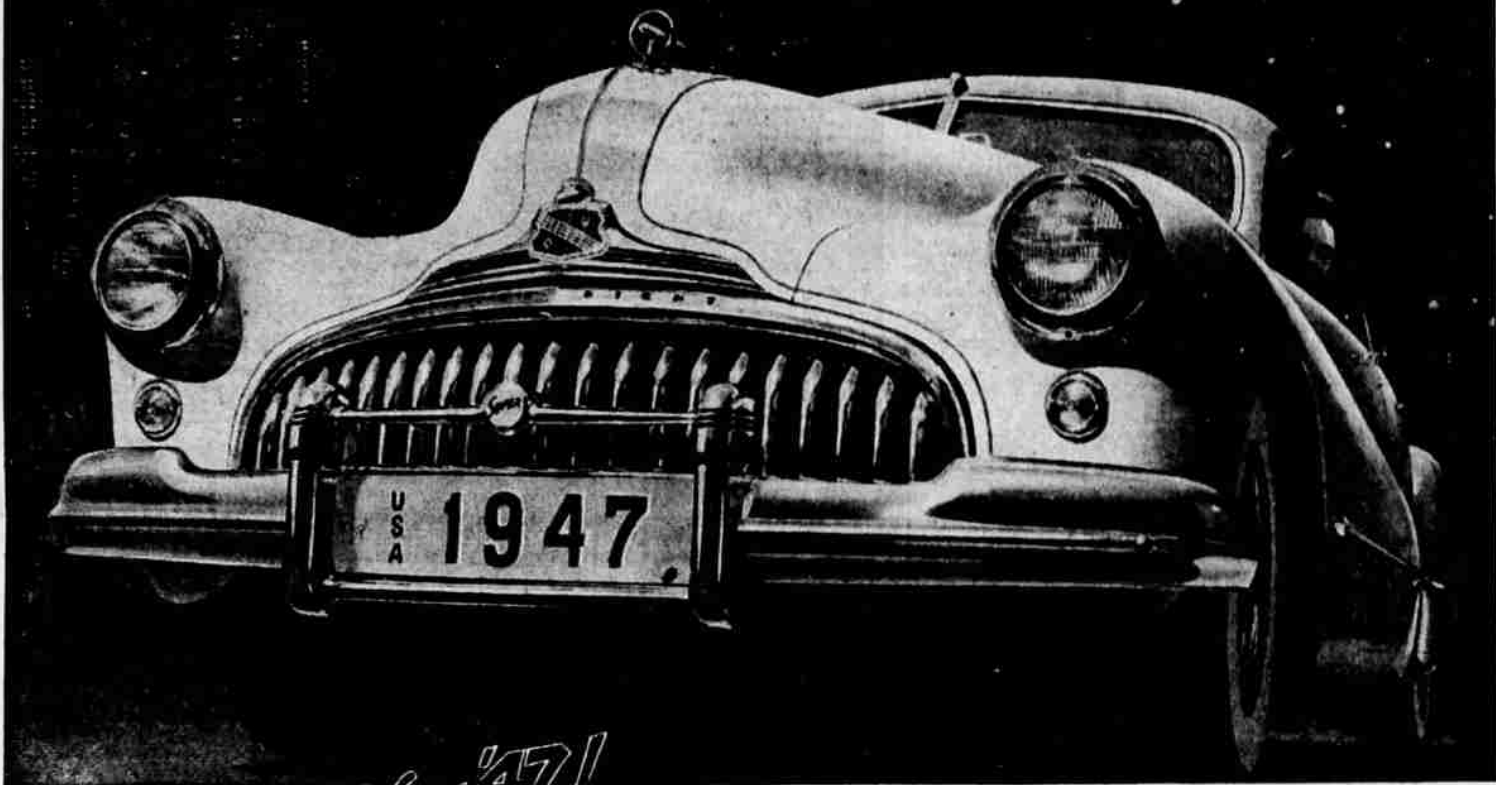
