

# Pelicans Edged Out 52-51 In Overtime

### Oregon Frosh Come From Six Points Back To Tie Game 47-47 At Finish, Beat Klamath Boys In Extra Length

Having to fight inch by inch for an advantage on the Klamath Union high school hardwood last night, the University of Oregon Frosh beat the Pelicans 52 to 51 on two long push shot baskets by Charlie Rufner in the first minute of an overtime period and a foul shot point by Pat Wohlers later on. The Klamath boys, who had put up a magnificent battle all through the game, managed only two buckets, both by Joe Zarosinski, in that extra time.

The score at the end of the regular length was 47-47, and the collegians had to make up a six-point shortage after the four-minute automatic time out to get into the overtime play-off.

LeRoy Coleman and Clarence Bussman virtually stole the show and the game for the Pels with their passing and shooting. Coleman scored 21 points and Bussman 17.

The Frosh took the early game lead and held onto it through the first quarter, finishing off at 9 to 14. The Oregon racehorse style of galloping and the usual Pelican speed made for a terrifically fast game.

As the second period wore on, the Pels began creeping up. With the score pushed to 12-17, LeRoy Coleman popped in a crumple and then a long shot to place the Pels only one point behind. Then Coleman bounced passed to Bussman for a quickie and the lead. Coleman sank a technical foul shot to make it 19-17, but Ken Johnson tied it up with a lay-in and Wohlers and Elton Lantz hit free throws to let the Duckings lead 21-19 at the half.

That margin was good for most of the third period, then with two minutes of the stanzas to go and the Pels on the short end of 33-30, Coleman dropped in a long angling two-pointer, then got a rebound under the Frosh bucket and raced the length of the court to flop in a side-long pass for the lead, 34-33.

At that juncture the tiring Duckings took their fifth time out.

That two-point lead had grown to six points—45-39—at the midway mark of the fourth period when the Frosh began to get back into the game. They had a record of 19 straight wins to salvage.

Rufner hit a foul shot, Lantz a bucket, Rufner another foul shot and Bill Green swished in a long one, tying the score at 45-45. Coleman gave the Pels another breath by rimming a free throw, but the Lantz was fouled. He missed his shot but tall Roger Mockford tipped it in to give the Frosh the lead. Coleman evened it with another foul shot completion. The college boys missed two shots at the twine as the fourth quarter closed, 47-47.

Rufner's two buckets and Wohlers' free shot won the game in the overtime, but the Frosh stalled out 50 seconds while the Pels were all most crying for possession of the ball.

About 1400 hoop fans saw the game. In the opener Hal's Sports of the Basin loop defeated the Pelican Jayvees 42 to 39 after leading 15-6 at half-time. The Junior Pels scored 22 points in the third quarter, but it wasn't quite enough.

## Grants Pass Upsets Black Tornado, 34-32

Although the Klamath Pelicans lost a non-conference game last night, they picked up half a game in the standings of district 4 as the Grants Pass Cavemen surprised everybody by dumping the Medford Black Tornado 34 to 32.

In the basketball standings of the district as of today Klamath is in undisputed first place for the first time this season with seven wins and a loss. Medford has seven victories and two defeats. No matter how the Grants Pass-Medford return tilt comes out tonight, the Pels are still ahead.

Further down in the standings, Ashland took a firmer grip on fourth place and pushed Central Point deeper into the cellar with a 38-33 win.

Around the Oregon prep basketball circuit there were other upsets. In district 9 Beavertron trounced the favored Hillsboro team, 41-35, leaving Forest Grove the district leader. Forest Grove scored its sixth straight Tualatin-Yamhill valley win, 64-51 over Tigard.

Bend continued the favorite in district 3, but ran into a non-district upset by Springfield, 47-45.

Farther north Hood River came within a game of clinching a berth in the district 2 play-off. The Blue Dragons defeated The Dalles, 51-32, to take a 2-1 lead in the five-game series. They meet again tonight.

The defending state champion, Eugene, kept right on rolling, this time making Cottage Grove the victim, 46-18. It was Eugene's 11th straight victory in district 6.

Lebanon vaulted to the fore in district 7, spilling Corvallis 32-23. Albany, which has a single loss like Lebanon, has played fewer games, stayed in the race with a 45-36 victory over Sweet Home.

McMinnville and Newberg, district 8 teams, continued to toe the Tualatin-Yamhill valley race. McMinnville defeated West Linn, 55-48, while Newberg trounced Tillamook, 6-37.

Molalla continued to lead in district 12, and Milwaukie crept into second place with a 43-41 win over Oregon City.

Central Catholic became the leader of district 13, downing the coast-town rival, Columbia Prep, 42-32. Columbia Prep won an earlier game, 31-30, a third game is scheduled.

In district 14 St. Helens and Rainier stayed at the top. St. Helens trimming Vernonia, 30-25, while Rainier lambasted Seapooone 53-35.

In Portland Washington and Roosevelt continued to head the race for the city's two berths in the state tourney. Washington defeated Sabin, 56-40, while Roosevelt downed Lincoln, 57-43.

# Graziano May Get Bout Yet

NEW YORK, Feb. 8 (AP)—Although Rocky Graziano may be barred for life in New York, his rich middleweight title bout with Tony Zale isn't necessarily off, because indications today were the National Boxing Association will not go along with his banishment and will sanction the match in another city—maybe Chicago.

The commission revoked Graziano's New York boxing license yesterday for failure to report a couple of \$100,000 bribe offers in (1) a fight in which he scored a knockout and (2) a fight which was never held.

All signs today indicated that NBA, which controls boxing virtually everywhere else in the United States outside of New York, would give Rocky a severe reprimand but would not invoke such a drastic penalty as lifetime banishment. Consequently it was freely forecast that the Graziano-Zale bout probably would get a "green light" this summer.

Already two different Chicago promoters, Ben Zenoff and James Williams, have bid for the bout which had been expected to draw \$400,000 in Madison Square Garden March 21.

The NBA's capable president, Abe Greene, is planning to hold his own inquiry and ask Graziano to tell him the story. Then he'll poll the NBA executive committee members to decide the course of action.

Rocky says he didn't report the bids to "take a dive" to Eumny Davis in 1945 and Ruben Shank last December because he looked on them as "a gag" made by "the kinda guy" who would be "back five minutes later to put the touch on me for a loan."

### Prelim Card Lined Out

Four preliminary fights have been lined up for Tuesday night's boxing card, including a heavy-weight semi-windup.

Armory fans will see tall Ernie Duffield of Bakersfield get into the ring with even taller Gordon McKay of Henley in a five-rounder. McKay stands six-foot-six, while Duffield is a mere six-foot-five. Both lip the scales at some 15 pounds over the 200 mark.

Midway point on the card will be a middleweight duel between Eddie Johann of Redding and Joe Maravilla of Napa, Ida., who has fought here once before. The Mexican boy was decisively won by Bruce Miller last August, but he has been back in town for about a month and works out steadily at the Salvation Army gym.

Jim Herbert and David Captin, welterweights, will have the four-round opener, and Darrell Harrington and Shadow Kirk the four-round lightweight second event.

Main event is 10 rounds between Ursal Snapp and Kelly Jackson.

### Game District Set Up On Coast

PORTLAND, Feb. 8 (AP)—The state game commission said today that a new game district is being established in the southwest coastal area, with headquarters at Coquille.

Leslie Zumwalt will be assigned to Coquille as senior biologist. The district extends from Cape Perpetua in northwest Lane county to the California line and east to the coast range crest.

This is the 12th district set up in Oregon as part of the plan to assign field staff personnel to different areas for management of game resources.

# Louis-Godoy Gate Small

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 8 (AP)—World's Heavyweight Boxing Champion Joe Louis' first exhibition with Arturo Godoy last night in his Latin-American tour drew a small crowd which expressed little pleasure and considerable distaste.

The great 60,000 seat bull ring was about one-fifth occupied. There was no announcement of attendance or receipts but it looked as if everyone but the fighters lost money. They got their's before they came here; Louis \$50,000 and Godoy, Chilean champion, \$10,500.

Louis and his trainers took passage on the first morning plane for San Salvador where Joe is to put on an exhibition with his sparring partner, Walter Heafer.

The heavyweights boxed 10 two-minute rounds with 14-ounce gloves. It was a tame affair which contained very little slugging and no damage. Godoy, who showed a tendency to stick close to the champion and prevent him from opening up, unofficially earned the sixth and eighth rounds by a narrow margin.

Louis outclassed the Chilean during the rest, except for the first and third rounds which unofficially were called even.

Louis weighed 213, Godoy 210.
