Jap Assassination Plan Stopped

TOKYO, Feb. 8 (AP)—Plans for the assassination of Premier Shigeru Yoshida were frustrated today with the arrest of a would-be assassin by police in Matsuyama, on Shikoku island, Kyodo news agency reported.

The prisoner, identified as Aono Yamakawa, 25, of Matsuyama, was reported to have had on his person when arrested a pistol and complete plans for carrying out the assassination. Yamakawa reportedly asserted he had 10 comrades in the plan three of whom already were in the Tokyo area. Tokyo metropolitan police force began an immediate investigation.
