## Lake Sees Two Accidents

Two minor accidents marred the day at Crater Lake national park Sunday when Glen Yost of Medford suffered a sprained left knee while skiing and two Medford cars received bent fenders in a skid-collision.

Drivers of the cars, Dean Showers, 20, 712 W. 2nd street, Medford, and McDonald Devaney, 1012 E. Judson, Medford, were not injured when their cars skidded into a collision about one-half mile below the parking area at headquarters. Fenders on both cars were bent.

Yost, 16, was given first aid by park rangers when he sprained his left knee while skiing on Solinsky hill. He was taken home in a private car.

Cars entering the park Sunday numbered 208, of which 110 were first-timers. There were 800 visitors. The temperature was mild, rising to 39 degrees at maximum and falling only to 22 degrees minimum. Temperature at 8:30 a. m. Monday was 28. One inch of new-fallen snow Sunday night made the snow depth on the ground 101 inches.

Fog wreathed the park Monday morning but no storm was predicted and skiing conditions are reported excellent. Some ice and snow is on the roads and while chains may not be required park authorities advise having them in the cars.

## Two Plays To Be Presented
