

# Italy Asks Revision Of New Treaty

ROME, Feb. 11 (AP)—Italy served notice today upon the 20 nations which wrote the Italian peace treaty that she felt entitled to a revision of the document, signed yesterday in Paris.

At the same time United States Ambassador James C. Dunn who presented his credentials last week, told a news conference he did not take seriously the anti-allyed demonstrations yesterday marking Italy's "Day of Mourning" for the signing of the treaty.

In Trieste 10 persons were arrested yesterday during a pro-Italian demonstration protesting the treaty, which, when ratified, will make Trieste free international territory.

In Pola, industrial center near Trieste which will be turned over to Yugoslavia, British military authorities invoked a 17-hour curfew after the slaying of a British brigadier, R. W. M. De Winton, by an Italian woman described as a fanatical patriot. The woman was detained. British authorities said her name was Maria Pasquinelli.

An Italian government note to the 20 nations which helped write the treaty said "we all look forward, as Italians and as world citizens, waiting for a revision of what might paralyze or poison the life of a people of 45,000,000 human beings living upon a soil which cannot possibly nourish them."

# Merchant Hits Alley Move

Repercussion on their edict of keeping alleys clear to handle downtown truck delivery, was felt Monday night by members of the city council when A. H. Bussman, former councilman and owner of Murphy's Seed store, protested the action in no uncertain terms.

Bussman said that he had parked in the alley at the rear of his place of business on 9th and Klamath for the last four years and it was impossible for him to find another place in the near vicinity of his building for the short-time parking of his trucks when they are not in use. He went on to explain that the alley in question was 20 feet wide and a truck parking there did not block the alley for traffic whatsoever.

When asked what he thought about the problem, Police Chief Orville Hamilton said that he "was told to keep the alleys clear, and he was doing it." He added, "If you let him park in the alley you'll have to allow others the same privilege."

Bussman told the council that his problem was entirely different from others and that he handled far more merchandise tonnage than any of the other merchants. He added that if the police made him conform to the ruling he could close the alley entirely by loading and unloading his own trucks in it.

Mayor Eg Ostendorf asked the council its wishes in the matter and was answered by Councilman Paul O. Landry that it "wasn't much the council could do on the matter." It was finally placed in the lap of the police committee for study.

# Property Owners Protest Building Of Curing Plant

T. D. Horner, 1907 Wantland, appeared before the city council in session Monday evening to protest the attempt of a local firm to build a curing plant in the vicinity of his home. Horner had with him a petition signed by 13 property owners in block 3 and 4 of Industrial addition asking that the two block be re-zoned from class 4 industrial to class 2 residential.

Horner told the council that the disagreeable odor from the proposed plant would make living in its vicinity extremely unpleasant. The council told Horner they would consider the request.

City Engineer E. A. Thomas showed the council a plan for the proposed entrance to Gino Carini's new drive-in at S. 6th and E. Main. The traffic safety committee had recommended the plan to the council as being the least hazardous method for handling the traffic entering and leaving the establishment. Carini explained exactly what he planned to do and the council approved the plan and voted to accept the committee's recommendation.

A letter was read by Mayor Ed Ostendorf from the recreation committee asking that block 84 be withheld from sale until the committee has time to study it as a possible future site for a baseball park. The council agreed to withhold the land for 90 days.

Police Judge Harold Franey reminded the council that numerous lost and stolen bicycles are piling up at the station and police are getting anxious to get rid of some of the machines. Franey stated that some of the bikes have been in storage for

ASTORIA, Ore., Feb. 11 (AP)—The coast guard cutter Onondaga radioed today it was trying to get another line aboard the vessel Arrow, wallowing in heavy swells three miles off Willapa harbor.

The Arrow apparently slipped its tow line last night and drifted north. The message from the Onondaga did not specify, but the ship is four miles north of its previous reported position.

The cutter said, however, that the Arrow is in no danger, since the east wind is pushing the vessel away from shore.

The Arrow was being towed from Seattle by an army tug to the Mottball fleet when

NORFOLK, Va., Feb. 11 (AP)—Twenty-one hospitalized navy men were considered "out of danger" today from the effects of wood alcohol which they drank aboard two decommissioned naval vessels in port here and which brought death to seven of their comrades.

Fifth naval district headquarters reported today that the seventh victim was Myron Frank Romans, seaman first class, who died at 12:25 p. m. Monday. His nearest of kin was listed as his father, James Harlan Romans, of South Range, Wis.
