

Embezzler Does Good Job

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 12 (AP)—Assistant Bank Cashier Florence Edler Volkner embezzled \$10,000—but had a difficult time proving it!

Her story was revealed in Federal Judge Louis E. Goodman's court where she pleaded guilty yesterday to misappropriating bank funds and causing false entries.

Judge Goodman from the bench declared it was the most unusual embezzlement case in his experience.

He said Mrs. Volkner confessed before her perquisitions were discovered but that she was so troubled it took her a week to convince Bank of California officials she was telling the truth.

Furthermore, said the judge, she invested the money well and turned back to the bank not only the \$10,000 but also \$500,000 worth of real estate and securities.

Judge Goodman, who described Mrs. Volkner as "a good and even a doting mother," said she was entitled to the assets in excess of the \$10,000, and granted her two years probation.

George Bates, of Yuba City, Calif., halted his car but was rammed from the rear by a car driven by W. D. Hager, of Portland.

Hager suffered a minor knee injury.
