

League Meets In Pelican Party Room

A full and interesting afternoon was offered to members of the League of Women Voters who met January 29 at the Pelican party room. A lively discussion followed the reading of several measures now before the state legislature, particularly H. B. 47, which would shorten the compulsory number of school years from 12 to 8 years.

"Can Women Be Effective on the Washington Front, on the Salem Front, and on the Klamath Falls Front?" was the subject of an excellent panel discussion led by Mrs. H. P. Bosworth.

Mrs. Fred Rueck opened the discussion with a brief history of the league during its 25 years' existence. She stated that the objectives are the same now as when the organization was founded, namely the education of new voters, study by members to improve their understanding of government, the spreading of information to other women voters, and to urge participation in government by members, or by those whom the league considers good.

Mrs. E. A. Geary, discussing the effectiveness of league work on the Washington front, cited the wide publicity given to league members on the work of the United Nations from the time of its inception, the use of study groups for the discussion of our foreign policy, and the local meetings held during the past year on United Nations work.

Mrs. Twyla Ferguson explained the objectives of the work falling within the province of the state league, accompanying this explanation with a discussion of some of the state measures.

Mrs. M. P. Leonard illustrated the effectiveness of the local league in its origination of the committee on child health, care and welfare, which has been a factor to quicken interest in the local problem of juvenile delinquency.

Mrs. John C. Yaden, newly appointed president, presided. She urged all women to attend the next meeting, Wednesday, February 26, and promises a profitable afternoon to those who sincerely wish to understand the power of their voting privilege.

DAR Hears Discussion On Radio

Bud Chandler, manager of radio station KFLW, was guest speaker at the regular monthly meeting of Eulalona chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, held Monday evening at the home of Mrs. Bert C. Thomas, 828 Pacific Terrace. Mrs. Hugh T. Michelmore was co-hostess.

Mr. Chandler's subject was "Radio's Freedom of Speech," and he gave a brief review of the history of the establishment of radio as a national asset, also some sidelights on the organization of a station. Regarding the future of radio in the United States, the speaker said that with frequency modulation, facilities within the next year or eighteen months, and that television will be a practical operating actuality in cities the size of Klamath Falls within five or ten years.

This expansion, he made clear, will accommodate minority groups not now heard on the limited facilities available. Mr. Chandler's talk was most informative and much appreciated. Mrs. Charles Griffith, program chairman, introduced the speaker.
