

Strikes 'n Spares

Up near the far north end of the county at Gilchrist a new bowling league just finished its first week of play. Eight teams drawn from the town and mill form the circuit and roll on the good Gilchrist alleys. The teams are called Sawmill, Office, Planing Mill, Townsite, Woods, Kilns, Shipping and Fallers. The names explain themselves.

With one series gone by Fallers and Shipping are in the hole, zero and three, while Sawmill and Office won their three-game matches. Planing Mill and Townsite got a two-and-one split with Woods and Kilns. D. Anderson had a 566 series and Lare a 242 line.

On the team level the Bonanza squad rolled a 1070 five-man line for high in that department, but the score was duplicated by the Jack's Shell team in the Automotive loop. Jack Pyle rolled 185-217-175-577 for his squad in beating Anderson Motors.

Other team games included Matt Finnigan's 1065, Rogers Jewelry 1059, Bill Davis Associated 1058 and Balsiger Motors 1044.

NEW YORK, Feb. 13 (AP)—Floyd Bevins, the right-handed pitcher from Salem, Ore., is all set to play his third year for the New York Yankees.

The 29-year-old giant, who won 16 and dropped 13 last season, inked his 1947 contract yesterday. Bevins ranked second to Spud Chandler on the Yankee mound staff in 1946.

The contract figure is estimated between \$12,500 and \$15,000.

PASCOUGOULA, Miss., Feb. 13 (AP)—Leonard Pecou, former Houma, La., baseball player has become the first of five Evangeline league players declared ineligible by Judge W. G. Bramham to appeal Bramham's decision to a higher authority.

Pecou, who prior to entering professional baseball was employed in a New Orleans horse racing handbook establishment, said he had written Chairman Clarence H. Rowland of the Minor league executive committee protesting his being placed on the ineligible list.

"I will fight to the last ditch the charge of throwing any game," Pecou wrote the committee chairman, "because even if I never play professional ball again, any charge of throwing a game could ruin my name in any other field of endeavor I enter."

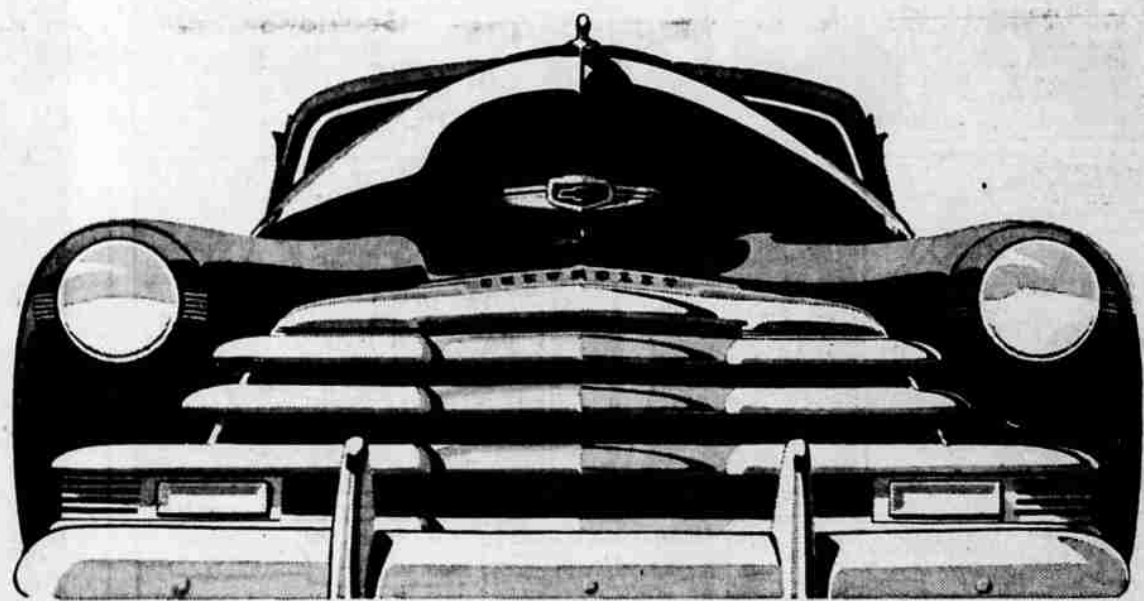
