

Dry Season In West Will Mean Cutting Cattle On Range, Fall Reseeding

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—The agriculture department suggested today that western cattlemen would find it to their advantage to reduce cattle numbers on ranges this year in anticipation of a new drought hazard.

In a 1947 farm production outlook report, the department said cattle numbers are high and are pushing to the limit ranges which have grown abundant feed through several years of generally favorable weather.

"But when weather becomes less favorable, fewer cattle can be kept," the report said.

The department said one of the most important adjustments many ranchmen can make this year and next is to reseed their summer-fall ranges.

The department said sheep numbers, on the other hand, should be increased. Since 1943 sheep numbers have declined more than 25 per cent in the 15 western states. Many sheepmen switched to cattle, and many mixed outfits went out of the sheep business because of a shortage of skilled herders.

Despite six consecutive years of high production, western farmers were said to be still geared for top production of crops as well as of livestock. It said a more abundant supply of labor and machinery will be available than last year, but production costs are higher.

"The potential damage (from wind erosion) is so great," the report said, "that regrassing should be done as soon as possible while moisture is available. A few successive dry years might very well result in severe wind erosion in some areas."

Wheat farmers, with three successive record-breaking crops behind them, are being called on for large production again this year. This will postpone largely their return to better soil conserving crops and practices.

Price Support Activity
As hinted a week ago, DoA now is moving forward on disposal of heavy quantities of surplus stock. First action was the authorized dumping of reesterated and low grade spuds, including fringe No. 1's. Latest development is authorization to move into the unmanageable surplus of good bin-run stock to a total of about 18 million bushels in five states, chiefly Maine, with substantially smaller quantities in New York, Minnesota, North Dakota and Michigan. Instructions are to dispose first of low grade and deteriorating stock, as is proper, and to move into the good lots only to the extent necessary to get this much of the job done. Spud Supply Highlighted By Big Dumping Program

Spud supply changes are routine market disappearance, plus an accelerated DoA dumping program. Planting is general in the chief areas which normally market in May, and will move northward with the coming of spring weather. Some planting already has been done in North Carolina, probably the earliest on record, but the current crop wave probably will hold most plantings there to about the average, which is around February 15. Fort Meyers, Florida is now shipping, with yields good and earlier maturity than was expected. Trade country, as reported before, is making fairly satisfactory progress, but weather has been conducive to slight. The winter crops in both Florida and Texas are finished.

Shipments last week fell off again in spite of the heavier government car movement. Total was 4500 cars compared with 5000 the week before. Government cars were 443 compared with 277 cars the week before, of principally Maine stock, much of which is export shipments. Commercial movement was 479 cars daily plus an unknown but evidently large movement by truck. Maine changed only a little, moving up to 1550 cars for the week. Idaho was off 1000 cars, Colorado 200, Nebraska 1000 cars against 1302 through January 26. These slight changes are mainly seasonal, although support prices are expected, however, while our own markets are tending to run below support levels.
