## Land Sought For Park Site

Disposition of a five-acre plot of ground adjacent to South 6th street and lying between Hope and Ward streets is of current interest to residents of that suburban community and to the Klamath county school board. The five-acre plot is sought for a park and recreational area and for a possible site for a future school house. The land is owned by Klamath county.

Attention was first focused on the area some months ago when Harry L. Ward, long-time resident of the community who has farmed the land, sought its use as a park. Ward, who was responsible some years ago for establishment of one of the most outstanding parks in Wyoming, is interested in seeing a similar park here.

Community cooperation in the problem of landscaping has been promised if the land is used for a park, shade trees and shrubs have been donated, a local mechanic has promised to build playground equipment and tentative plans call for a ball ground and tennis court.

A city bus route passes the property and irrigation water is available.

Hundreds of children living in this area are without playground facilities, it is pointed out by those interested in seeing a park established. Numerous civic and social organizations have pledged support for the project.

On the other side of the ledger is the possible need for school expansion at some future time and while no option has been taken by the school board on the ground, it was announced Friday by Harold Ashley, county school superintendent, that the county court has taken under advisement the suggestion that the land be retained for this purpose.

## Crippled Antarctic Shop Starts Trip For Home

ABOARD THE MOUNT OLYMPUS, Feb. 13 (Delayed) (AKO)—The icebreaker Northwind brought the crippled cargo ship Merrick out of the ice pack this afternoon and began the trip of 1500 miles to New Zealand. The Merrick's sister ship, the transport Yancy, is accompanying her.

Rear Adm. Richard H. Cruzen, transferred to the icebreaker Burton Island, which immediately reentered the icepack for Little America, where, by herself, she will evacuate the 197 men left behind there. She will begin the operation about March 1.

Geologist Dr. Arthur Howard, Biologist Jack E. Perkins, two seamen, three news correspondents and two emperor penguins, "Butch" and "Babe," were transferred from the Northwind to the Mount Olympus when the Merrick's accident caused the

sacrifice of a scientific trip to McMurdo sound. The Mount Olympus steamed past huge icebergs to Scott Island, where she will await the arrival in March of the crowded Burton Island. The Olympus will serve as their weather station in the interim, and if weather permits, small boat will approach the jagged island. A magnetic observation station then would be established there by Dr. H. Herbert Howes of Arlington, Va. Explosives experts may blast steps up the 130-foot high island. The weather still was preventing flights of air groups on Little America.
