

Benny Was Darling Of Cloak-And-Suiters; Now Leonard Is One Of Them Himself---

NEW YORK, Feb. 18 (NEA)—Benjamin Leonard survived two disconcerting knockouts suffered before he was 17 to become the idol of New York's cloak-and-suiters. Now Leonard—the name became Leonard through the mistake of an announcer—is one himself.

Benny Leonard, now crowding 51 and on the portly side, is also seen in the nation's rings as a referee.

Joining the maritime service at the outbreak of World War II as a lieutenant, Leonard headed his recreation and morale service bureau, was discharged after four years as a commander. He was an army boxing instructor in World War I.

Leonard married Jacqueline Stern of California in 1934, and the couple is as much a part of New York as Times Square. Leonard is an accomplished after dinner speaker.

Leonard was one of the mighty few lightweights compared with the immortal Joe Gans. Old-timers will tell you that few fighters shifted twisted fire from head to body and back again quite like him.

Coming out of New York's teeming lower east side in no-decision days, Leonard had to knock out clever Freddie Welsh to acquire the lightweight leadership, May 28, 1917. Leonard knocked out every contender and name fighter in or near the division except Lew Tendler—Mandot, Hammer, Richie and Pinky Mitchell, Kilbane, Ritchie, White, Welling and Kansas, among them.

Leonard was so good he could carry a first-class opponent without the latter troubling it.

Among smaller men the ring has never had an attraction to compare with Leonard. His first match with Lew Tendler at Jersey City's Boyle's Thirty Acres drew \$367,862, the return at the Polo Grounds \$452,646. Leonard's lightweights still stands.

Leonard, a laked southpaw Tendler out of the first fight, gave him a pasting in the second.

Leonard retired unbeaten as a lightweight in 1925 after seven years as champion.

After being on the sidelines seven years, Leonard was driven back into the thick of things by reality setbacks in Jersey City. He was 36, fat and with thinning hair, yet boxed his way to a match with Jimmy McLarnin at Madison Square Garden, nearly dropping the younger Irishman in the opening round, protesting when Referee Arthur Donovan intervened in the sixth without his once having been off his pins.

Benny Leonard modeled himself after Joe Gans, has been the model since.

Wildcats Hurry Up Search For Successor To Waldorf

CHICAGO, Feb. 18 (AP)—In a race against an April 3 deadline, the date Northwestern's spring football drills open, Athletic Director Ted Payseur today was buzzing around the country hunting a head coach.

Instead of a road map, he was guided by a hastily compiled list of candidates which include at least three college and two pro coaches. He hoped to have chats with as many as possible in his search for a replacement for Lynn Waldorf, who suddenly took the head coaching assignment at the University of California, before winding up his three-day whirlwind expedition tomorrow.

Last seen, Payseur was heading for Columbia, Mo., to offer a contract to Don Faurot, bossman of the Missouri Tigers. The pact probably ranges between \$10,000 and \$12,000 yearly.

From Missouri—according to Chet Gargas, assistant Northwestern athletic director—the trail is expected to lead into Ohio where Payseur will corner Ray Nolting, formerly a dashing performer for the Chicago Bears and now a successful mentor at Cincinnati university. Then on to Cleveland to speak to another prominent prospect, Bob Voight, line coach for Paul Brown's Cleveland Browns, all-American conference pro champion.

Sled Race Into Snow

ASHTON, Ida., Feb. 18 (AP)—There's not enough snow at Ashton, so the community's American dog derby sled races next Saturday will be run on a new site, 22 miles north of here.

Almost every year since 1917 the race has been run, and only once—in 1920—was it cancelled because of lack of snow. However, in 1934 wheels were attached to the sleds because the ground was bare.

This year A. R. (Bud) Clouse, president of the Ashton Dog Racing association, said a new site was decided upon. Snow on the ground there is three and a half feet deep, and the weather is cold enough to indicate there will be little melting before time for the event.

A two-mile zig-zag course for dog sled races and a quarter-mile straight track for cutter and bob sled races will be built.

The derby will be ten miles long, with the teams making five laps on the two-mile course.

Everett Heseaman, 1946 winner and victor four times, will seek the derby trophy once more. Last year's runner-up, Austin Neeley of Teton, also will run again.

Bivins, slamming away from the first bell, was the unanimous choice of both judges and the referee. He opened the Philadelphia's eye early in the first round and kept the wound bleeding, by vicious jabbing, throughout the fracas.

Pitt Has New Chief

PITTSBURGH, Feb. 18 (AP)—The University of Pittsburgh had its fourth football coach in eight years today — Walter (Mike) Milligan—and there was hope the new mentor would restore the Panthers to the gridiron heights they once enjoyed.

Previous efforts by Charley Bowser, T-Master Clark D. Shaughnessy and Wesley Fesler, resulted in a drab record of 27 wins, 42 losses and two ties.

Milligan, 42-year-old Pitt graduate, was named yesterday. He replaced Fesler who resigned to take over the head coaching duties of Ohio State university.

The Pitt portfolio marks Milligan's first head coaching chore, although he served a long apprenticeship as an assistant at Pitt, Florida and Tulsa. He aided Josh Cody at Florida in 1939 and 1940 and served five years in the same capacity under Henry Frika at Tulsa.

Cage Backers Have Trouble

SEATTLE, Feb. 18 (AP)—Directors of the Pacific Coast Professional Basketball league were to hold a special meeting in Bellingham today to iron out schedule and playoff difficulties brought about through the withdrawal of three of the league's original seven clubs.

Latest of the clubs to withdraw was the Spokane Blazers. Announcement of its termination came jointly from Matt Clark, Seattle, and Dan Hays, Salem, owners. It was said that financial reasons and inability to improve the clubs' brought about the decision.

The league swings back into action in the tulip city tonight with Portland, the league leader, opening a two-game series with the second-place Bellingham Firecrackers.

Leo A. Harris . . . Ex-Tribesman Named Duck Athletics Boss

Reorganization of the University of Oregon athletic setup, with an eye to recouping the Webfoot athletic fortunes, went ahead another step yesterday with the appointment of Leo A. Harris, ex-Stanford footballer, to the newly-created post of director of athletics.

Announcement of the choice of Harris was made by University President Harry K. Newburn.

Harris' appointment is effective July 1, but he is expected to come to Eugene from California within the next month or six weeks to aid in getting together an athletic budget for the coming year. Anse Cornell, athletic manager for many years, will become business manager on Harris' staff.

Oregon now has a new football coach (Jim Aiken), a new assistant coach (Frankie Zazula) and the new athletic director. One more assistant to Aiken is to be appointed after spring football practice.

Harris is currently superintendent of Carmel, Calif., schools. He was a two-year letterman in football at Stanford and won three letters in basketball.

He played with the Indians in the 1927 Rose Bowl game when Stanford tied Alabama 7-7. His coaching experience includes work at Fresno high school and Fresno State.

Andy Honzel, member of the Sacred Heart Trojans basketball team, was admitted to Klamath Valley hospital yesterday afternoon with a broken leg, received in the county school basketball tourney Saturday night.
