

# Paving Of City Streets Discussed By Council

City Engineer E. A. Thomas presented a map to the city council last night showing the streets from 6th to 8th, and Willow to Oak, along with petitions for the paving of 7th street between Willow and Oak, and Plum street between 6th and 8th. Thomas explained that all the property owners along 7th were agreeable to the assessment for the paving of that street, but that one person, Mrs. Iona James, objected to the assessment for the paving of Plum street. Mrs. James, he explained, owns property fronting on both streets, she would agree to pay for paving 7th, but not Plum.

He further stated that the West-Hitchcock corporation had contacted him in regard to closing the alley which runs from 7th to 8th, between Willow and Plum. The firm, he explained, owns about half the block fronting on 7th and wants to fence in the entire area through which the alley runs. They in return, he added, would provide an exit on their own property for the remainder of the present alley.

The council took both matters under consideration and it was decided to appoint a council member to talk to Mrs. James regarding the paving of Plum street.

In regards to paving, Councilman E. F. Condrey stated that 10 blocks of unpaved street were left in Mills addition between Mitchell and Washburn way, from Orchard to Union. The council, he stated, would like to pave these streets during the next year and asked that any of the property owners who were interested in getting the streets paved, should contact City Engineer E. A. Thomas.

Condrey also said that he and the city engineer had looked over the drainage situation along Pershing way, between Larch and Washburn way, in the new annexation on S. 6th. The drainage ditches, he said, should be cleaned out and the culverts under the individual driveways should be cleared. He recommended that the city engineer proceed with the job, and the council approved his recommendation.

Walter Wissendanger, owner of the Sunset grocery which suffered damage in the Sunday morning fire at the Evans apartments, asked approval of the city council in having the building inspected for safety and for permission to conduct a sale of goods in the store.

The grocer said that he wanted

a quit claim deed to the property. It was questioned by the council whether they should take any action as the mistake was not that of the city, but of the church group. Finally the council ordered Perkins to draw up an ordinance providing for a quit claim deed to be presented to the church.

A recommendation was read from the cemetery committee asking that a stop sign be placed on the highway at the entrance to the new cemetery for the purpose of safety during funerals. The recommendation of the committee was accepted.

The cemetery committee also recommended that an automatic lawn mower be purchased from the J. W. Kern company for use at the cemetery. It too was approved.

Mayor Ed Ostendorf asked all city department heads to have their annual budgets for the next fiscal year ready by the first of March so that they could be presented to the budget committee at its first meeting.

In a discussion of the reurfacing of 3rd street between McKinley and Roosevelt, it was stressed that the lots along the stretch of street are all city owned lots, and others must keep off. It was decided that 3rd street would be surfaced with gravel and the city engineer was ordered to do so.

Police Judge Harold Franey told the council that he had been asked by the operators of the

M&M market and Klamath Falls Creamery if they could widen the pavement on their side of Klamath between Commercial and Broad, by 64 feet. He explained that people are now parking on the parking strip, which is illegal, and that the move would eliminate the parking strip and provide more room for cars. Both of the concerns have offered to pay for the work. The council ordered the city engineer to furnish plans and specifications for the work to the property owners involved.

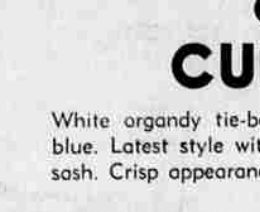

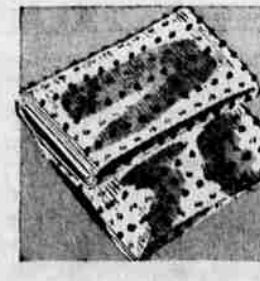
