All average costs before rate increases were taken from the 1944 Statistical Report of the Public Utilities Commissioner of Oregon.

Above average customer costs are compared with Oregon's largest operating gas utility which has the state's lowest average rates. This chart indicates our rates compare favorably with the state's largest and most efficient operating utility.

Higher Operating Costs Make Rate Increases Necessary

The following increases in Operating Costs necessitate an increase in rates to assure our customers of dependable and efficient service.

FUEL—Cost increased 41% since 1941.

WAGES—1946 labor costs show an increase of 108% over 1941 costs. Increased living costs for employees necessitated upward adjustment of wages.

TAXES—Our taxes for the support of good government in the communities we serve have increased 62%.

NEW CAPITAL EXPENDITURES—\$123,640.00 was expended for additional facilities to adequately serve our Oregon customers during 1946. \$180,000.00 will be needed for the same purpose during 1947.
