

Service Charges . . . Livestock Feed Fees Less Than Expected

A schedule of legitimate charges for services performed by potato growers under the livestock feed diversion program has been approved by the western region of production and market administration.

These fees can be added to the basic support price f.o.b. trucks in cases where the services are rendered. Where new bags are used 10 cents more can be added.

Fee schedule:

1. When potatoes are delivered bulk loaded at the farmer's gate, 1 1/2 cents for inspection, 5 cents for sacking, 7 1/2 cents for used sacks, and if sorting is necessary to take out soft rot, 5 cents for sorting.

2. When delivered sacked at the farmer's gate, 1 1/2 cents for inspection, 5 cents for sacking, 7 1/2 cents for used sacks, and if sorting is necessary, 5 cents for sorting if necessary.

3. Where potatoes are delivered sacked f.o.b. carrier, 5 cents for hauling, 2 1/2 cents for loading, 1 1/2 cents for inspection, 5 cents for sacking, 7 1/2 cents for used bags, 5 cents for sorting, and 5 cents for sorting if necessary.

4. Where a grower has graded out top quality U. S. No. 1 potatoes and marketed the top grades, the following charges will be allowed for potatoes delivered for livestock feed: 13 1/2 cents for grading, 5 cents for hauling, 2 1/2 cents for loading, 1 1/2 cents for inspection, 5 cents for sacking, 7 1/2 cents for used sacks and 5 cents for sorting.

A preliminary rate schedule had recommended that service charges in loading feed potatoes f.o.b. cars would be about 45 cents per 100 pounds, making the basic support price for No. 1's f.o.b. cars \$2.25.

The schedule quoted above allows only 31.5 cents under conditions of the third paragraph above, indicating that the support price from No. 1's would be only \$2.11 1/2 and for U. S. No. 2's \$2.05 1/2.

Over a long period, the average price of 100 pounds of live hog in the United States has been approximately the price of 12.1 bushels of corn.

Nip Wealth Liquidated

TOKYO, Feb. 20 (AP)—Allied headquarters said today it would liquidate 1,165,000,000 yen (more than \$77,000,000) of the assets of Japan's Zaibatsu families to break their stranglehold on the nation's finance and industry.

The holding company liquidation commission said personal securities of 56 of these families, which controlled the greater part of Japan's industries, would be put on public sale to "scatter them as widely as possible."

The families will be reimbursed in government bonds which cannot be cashed for 10 years and cannot be used for collateral.

Many months ago, the commission took 6,000,000,000 yen in assets of Zaibatsu holding companies.
