

## Local Realtors OK Sales Tax

At their weekly Wednesday noon luncheon meeting at the Willard, the Klamath Board of Realtors unanimously approved the retail sales tax measure as recently introduced into the state legislature under the title of HB 238.

Mr. E. M. Chilcote, local realtor and member of the Oregon Real Estate Board, cited important sections of the proposed measure and led the discussion of the bill which followed.

Mr. Chilcote pointed out that the measure provides for a 40 mill property tax limitation based on 50 per cent of the assessed valuation. He further cited that the measure provides

for a \$5000 exemption on state income tax.

It was also shown at the meeting that during the past few years a number of new enterprises have located north of the Columbia river in Washington due to the much lower real property taxes in that state. The proposed 40 mill limitation based on 50 per cent of the assessed value is exactly the same as that now in force in the state of Washington.

## Veterans Get Tax Deduction

Oregon veterans discharged from active duty any time during 1945 are entitled to \$3000 deduction on their state income taxes, and the same exemption applies for each year or part of a year in active service, George E. Sandy, director of veterans affairs, said today.

April 15 is the deadline for filing state income tax returns, veterans were reminded.

The \$3000 deduction is in addition to the regular personal exemption on incomes of less than \$750 for single persons and \$1500 for married persons living with their husband or wife, Sandy explained.

Veterans who served as enlisted personnel or in the lower

ranks of commissioned officers and who had little or no income other than service pay will have no tax liability in most cases for years of service, and Sandy said in such cases a letter should be sent to the tax commission setting out income received in each year for which a return has not been filed and no further return will be required.

Veterans so filing should give the date they entered service, date of discharge, and if they were officers, both the date they left active service and the date their terminal leave ended.

Oregon law says the full \$3000 may be deducted if a person was on active duty for any part of the tax year. It is not limited to service pay, but may be applied against any type of income. It may not be claimed, however, by a person who became a resident of Oregon after discharge unless he had income subject to Oregon tax during the period of service.

Base pay, flying pay, overseas pay, and retirement of regular army officers are taxable. Non-taxable are mustering-out pay, government allotments to dependents, amounts received under the GI bill, and pensions for total or partial disability, including amounts paid to retired emergency officers. Returns should be filed at the state tax commission offices in Salem, or at 1137 S. W. Yamhill, Portland.

## Publisher Buys Radio Station

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 20 (AP)—Sheldon Sackett, publisher of the Coos Bay Times and reported purchaser of the Vancouver, Wash., Sun, has announced purchase of Portland radio station KWWJ.

The purchase from John Egan and Wilbur J. Jerman, founders of the station, includes two buildings, frequency modulation station equipment and all assets. The price was reported at \$400,000.

Sackett now operates radio stations in Coos Bay, Vancouver and Oakland, Calif. Because Vancouver is in the Portland area, he will have to sell the station there under FCC policy, he said. A group headed by Nan Wood Honeyman, collector of customs, is interested in buying it, Sackett said.

### American Indian Day Proposed

HILLSBORO, Ore., Feb. 20 (AP)—Albert Jack Green, 16, Lake Grove, Ore., was held on a formal first degree murder indictment today in the robbery and slaying of Ralph Porritt, 49, Vancouver, Wash., salesman.

The boy was arrested three days after Porritt's body was found February 7 in the brush near Green's home.

The district attorney said the case probably would be brought into circuit court today.

## Warden Probes Prison Strike

SAN QUENTIN, Calif., Feb. 20 (AP)—Warden Clinton Duffy promised further investigation today of the latest stop-work demonstration at San Quentin prison after dispatching one convoy of 80 suspected ringleaders 110 miles away to Folsom prison under heavy guard last night.

Demanding more food and less work, jute mill workers suddenly refused to go back on the job after their noonday meal yesterday. They were joined by mill and quarry workers. There was no violence. In all, 265 convicts participated.

Warden Duffy asserted that San Quentin's 4200 inmates eat "a great deal better than many American families—and they are not overworked." He blamed a "gang of young hoodlums."

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## Economic Up Said Dream

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 20 (AP)—Dr. Blair Stewart, professor of economics at Reed college, told a community forum audience last night he could not see where claims of a great economic boom in the northwest were justified.

The economist said the only basic industry where any great expansion was probable was hydro-electric power production

and added "it is difficult to say what this will mean to the region."

He said he believed any expansion of metallurgical and electro-chemical industries might take up the employment slack from the depleted lumber industry, creating more stable labor status.

"Most of our basic northwest industries have been successfully exploited up to the limit of what the resource will stand," he said, "and a decline in forest products and mining industries was due."
