

# 23,485 Visit Crater Lake During 1946

An interesting roundup of travel figures to Crater Lake national park during 1946 was released today by E. P. Leavitt, park superintendent.

By stage and car and other means, the report shows 213,485 persons visited the park during 1946 in 64,557 vehicles. Of this number 600 persons gave foreign countries as their addresses and 172 of the cars bore foreign licenses.

Argentina, South Africa and The Netherlands each contributed one visitor, and Denmark, four. There were four cars and 15 persons from Panama, four cars and 30 people from Mexico and 548 cars and 164 visitors from Canada.

Eight cars bore Alaska license plates and 28 visitors gave Alaska as home addresses. Hawaiian licenses numbered 60 and there were 166 visitors from the islands. There were 13 visitors from the Canal Zone and four cars, and from the District of Columbia, 175 visitors and 67 cars. Guam had one car and two visitors at the park.

All of the 48 states of the union were represented with California leading the list with 80,749 visitors and 26,207 cars. Vermont was represented by 12 cars and 33 persons, the lowest figure from any state.

Of the visitors 192,073 made their first park entry in 1946, while 58,472 cars were listed as first entries. Stages carried 571 of the visitors and 81 persons were reported as arriving by miscellaneous means which may mean afoot or horseback, or by air, although no plane landings were reported.

 MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 21 (AP) — Today I am 36 years old, the first milestone past the half-way mark.

On birthdays I have the habit of tallying up what's gone before and estimating the prospects ahead. This gives a man the same kind of morbid pleasure a kid gets out of seeing how far he can stick a pin into his skin before it hurts.

This year I was going to fore-swear both the backward look and the forward glance, figuring that when you enter into the last half of your life expectancy about the best thing you can do is keep your head down and your insurance paid.

Then I bumped into Dick Rundell, who carried a rifle for Uncle Sammy in Germany. Dick served 21 months in the army and saw five foreign countries, but when somebody yells "Boy!" now he has to come running—a little self-consciously.

He is a copy boy on the Miami Herald at night. During the day he is an overgrown freshman at the University of Miami.

Dick is tall and 20. He has no doubts about what he wants. "I'm going to be a reporter," he told me and grinned — "wherever it will lead me."
